It is hereby certified that the Nebraska Mutual Cyclone, Tornado and Windstorm Insurance Co. of Lincoln, Nebraska, has complied with the insurance law of this state and is authorized to transact the business of tornado insurance in this state for the current year.

By the above you will see that the Cyclone Co. is on its feet, and the insurance of each member is made effective as soon as he pays his fees, which are: Membership \$1.00, survey \$1.00, an advance assessment fee of 10 cents per hundred dollars or fraction thereof (any Co. that asks more should be avoided).

At the time the insurance took effect, at noon, May 19, 1922, we had a little over \$185,000 worth of insurance on file from 38 counties.

We will send out the policies as soon as they can be made out and registered. Any one desiring to send in their fees will be receipted for same. Any one desiring to act as agent will please send 50 cents for auditor's certificate. Let us make an effort to have \$500,000 in this Co. this year.

Hail.

Below we give a copy of the contract as it will be. In this we have added rule 7, which we think is a good one, and also think no one will object to it, all will be benefitted thereby. We will give our reason for making this addition:

Since the printing of the contract on April 29th we have received several letters of criticism in accordance with our invitation, but most of them have been answered satisfactory except the ones that we had no way to collect after the member had hauled off his grain. Some think that we should have the cash in hand, others that a chattel mortgage on stock should be taken, but we have adopted this plan as the most feasible as it was the most popular among our (will be) members.

Its advantages are twofold. First: It gives a sound basis for the Company. Second: If a member is desirous of putting a mortgage on his crop the mortgagee will gladly accept a second mortgage when this one is the first if you make it payable to him. But in case a man wants to sell his crop before Nov. 1st he can make a deposit in any bank for the amount called for in his contract and send the certificate of deposit to the Co. which will be held until Nov. 1st, at which time we will draw on the bank for the pro rata amount needed and send the statement to the policy holder, giving name, P. O., and amount of loss of each member, plus the amount due from him, and then he may draw the rest from the bank.

At this time we have less than 25,000 acres promised, therefore if the farmers of this state are desirous to have this Co. started each one must send in his number of acres right away, or what would be better is that some one should take the name of every one of his neighbors who will insure, P. O., county and number of acres each would take and forward to me at once.

We have received many letters stating "the project is a good one and that lots of the neighbors would like to insure," and follow up by ordering some contracts, but do not promise to insure an acre, therefore our time and postage is spent answering in which we say that we have no contracts and will not have any until we have 100,000 acres promised.

We are working for the interest of all concerned and until we have the required amount promised we will avoid all expense possible and no printing will be done.

Reader, if you want a Company your own way is plain to be seen. Please hand this paper to your neighbor who does not take it and call his attention to the Insurance Department.

I hereby apply for insurance against loss or damage by hail in the Nebraska Mutual Hail Insurance Company on the following number of acres:

Total No. of acres insured _____ For which I hereby agree to pay a membership fee of fifty cents in cash and further agree to pay ten cents per acre for the first day of Nov., 1922, for the total number of acres above enumerated; and as much thereof as may be necessary to pay losses and expenses of the company.

The applicant hereby also agrees to be governed by the following rules:

- 1st. All losses in small grain will be adjusted during July, August or September; and losses on corn will be adjusted during October.
- 2nd. After the total amount of losses and expenses have been ascertained, the secretary will make an assessment on all members in proportion to the amount he has insured, and the amount thus collected will be apportioned to those who have had losses.
- 3rd. No member shall be paid more than five dollars per acre.
- 4th. In case the amount of losses exceed the amount collected, each member hereby agrees to accept in full payment of his adjusted claim his proportionate share of said amount collected.
- 5th. The member further agrees to pay his assessment within fifteen days after Nov. 1st.
- 6th. All losses will be paid December 1st.
- 7th. It is hereby stipulated and agreed that all growing grain above enumerated for insurance is hereby mortgaged to the extent of 10 cents per acre, total amount of said mortgage \$____, but said lien shall become void upon payment of said 10 cents per acre or such part of the said amount as shall be assessed on Nov. 1st, 1922.
