About Mirrors.

The necessity for something which would enable man to see his own face must have been early apparent, and in all probability the first mirror was the placid surface of a body of water. The next most accessible object was a piece of polished metal, and it was of this material that the first artificial mirrors were made. The Israelites, under Moses, had mirrors of brass, and doubtless other metals were used long before that period.

Black glass was used for mirrors, as well as transparent glass with some black substance on the back. It is related that the Spaniands found mirrors of polished black stone. both convex and concave, among the natives of South America. The mirrors of the ancient Greeks

and Romans were thin discs of bronze, highly polished, and usually fashioned with handles, though sometimes they were set upright on

Later on, silver was used, and the first mirror of solid silver is said to have been made by Praxiteles, in the time of Julius Casar. Subsequently silver mirrors took the place of brass or bronze ones almost altogether, though steel, copper, and even gold, were also employed. "Locking glassof metal were employed everywhere up to the fifteenth cent-
