In regular session assembled April 16, 1892, Gracelius Alliance, No. 559, unanimously passed the following resolution: That

WHEREAS, A penalty of 20 per cent is charged to all persons upon redeeming their lands sold for tax; and

WHEREAS, Such extreme rates of interest is in entire opposition to the laws which fix the legal rate of interest in this state at seven per cent, and all above ten per cent is usury; therefore be it

Resolved, By this Alliance that there is a condition of law upon our Statute books in this respect which should be made to harmonize. And be it further

Resolved, That we deem it as unjust and wholly in favor of the moneyed classes, and would respectfully recommend that this question come up before the next session of the state legislature for action.
