All losses on small grain will be adjusted at threshing time, corn losses at husking time, and all will be paid for December first.

Fire and Lightning.

There are men in different parts of the state on the road with circulars which state that a member is a stock holder of a mutual company and his farm has a contingent mortgage upon it for any amount the company may be called to pay, but let us look at these things square in the face and admit that it is true that all farms are mortgaged to the full extent of their value. What is the probable cost to members is the question that looks us in the face as farmers.

In many other states there have been mutual insurance company's for many years, and in all cases the grerege cost has been less than one per cent for five years insurance, and if you will look into the cases you will product use that in the mutual companies no one is paid fron i. e. 61 00 for each one waiten, and if the secretary is paid anything extra it is for time actually employed in the work. While in stock companies the agents fee is 25 per cent to 40 per cent of the amount of the premium, then each officer and director whether he then at the time of loss the losers finds that the valid policy law is evaded in all ways possible. In the mutual comdanies the losses are adjusted in a brotherly manner and eften the member gets double the amount he would have received had he been insured in a stock company, and with this in view the average of mutual companies is still-below one per cent. To prove that our estimate is correct we could go to the office of any stock company and see that the losses on farm insurance is below one per cent, but of course they would object to any one looking up their business. For want of time and space I will continue this next week.

IT is rumored that the state board of transportation will made a sweeping reduction of the rate on wet goods from Omaha to the state house by the way of Covington, Nebraska.

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
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
