

**The Greenback.**

This is the way an old soldier puts it: Suppose Uncle Sam should grind out a new \$5 bill and send it to me as pension money—what would I do with it? I'd buy \$5 worth of corn of neighbor A. 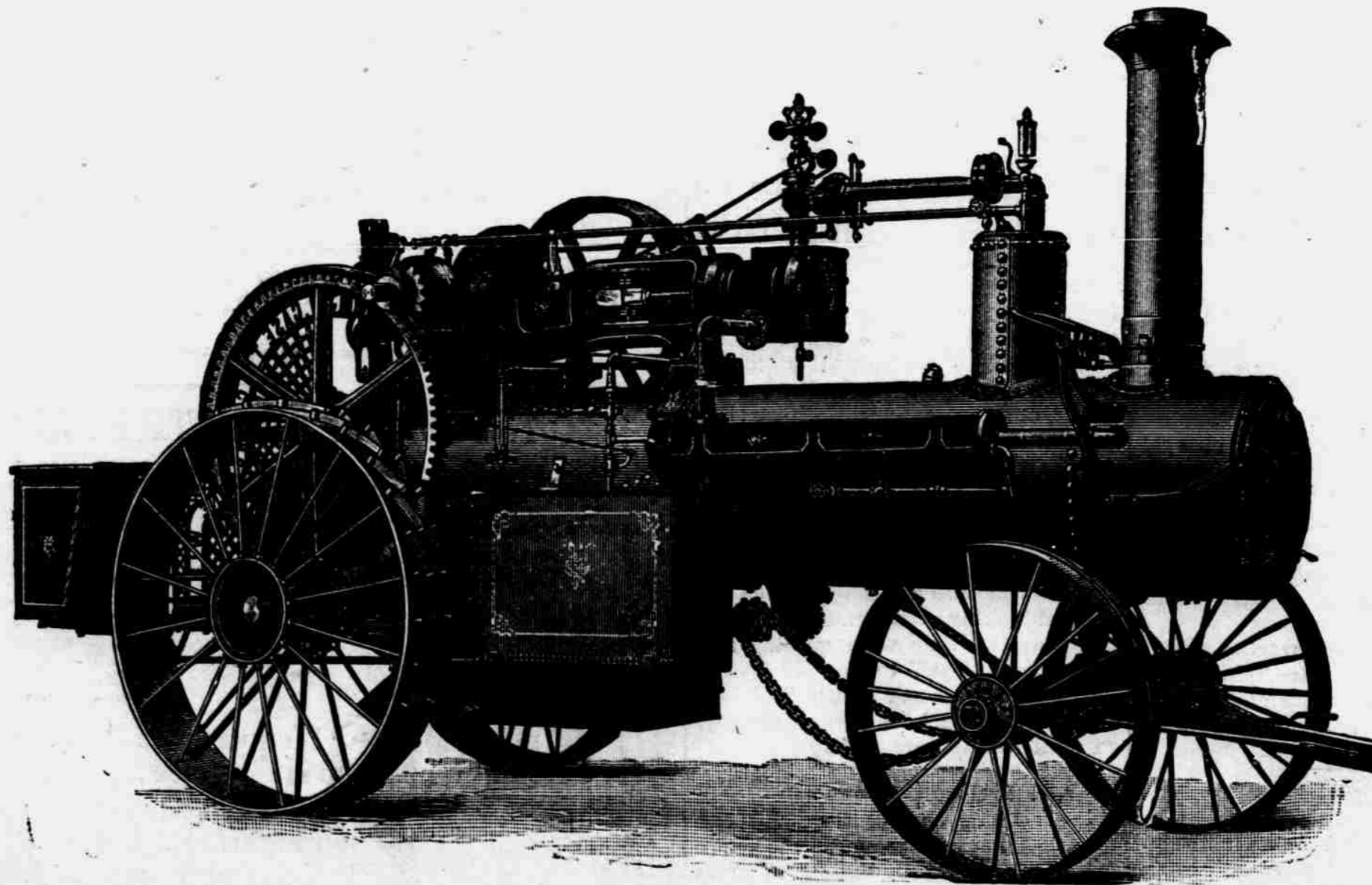
