Grand Rally at Sartoria.

Near the little village of Sartoria in the northern part of Buffalo county, September 6, occurred one of the great meetings of the campaign. Two oxen were roasted to feed the people. There were not less than 2,000 present. Gen. Van Wyck spoke an hour and a half and aroused the greatest enthusiasm. J. W. Edgerton followed giving the people facts and eloquence for nearly two hours.

After the meeting, a number of old line republicans openly started that they would vote the people's ticket in November.

The People's Party in New Jersey.

The state convention of the people's party in New Jersey met in Trenton September 6. J. R. Buchanan of Newark presided, and John W. Hays, general secretary of the K. of L. acted as secretary. A full electoral ticket was named, and a state ticket with Benjamin Bird for governor.

The platform endorses the Omaha platform and treats of the grievances of laboring men referring to the Homestead affair, and other recent labor troubles. The new party will have considerable support in New Jersey.

Kansas all Right.

TOPEKA, Kan., Sept. 10.—It will surprise the Republicans when the Populist leaders make public their first poll of the state. It will place the majority for the fusion electoral ticket at 50,000 and for the state ticket at 35,000 to 40,000. In the increased vote for a presidential year the Republicans are conceded a gain of 5,000 over the vote of two years ago, and the Populists claim 8,000.—Rocky Mountain News.

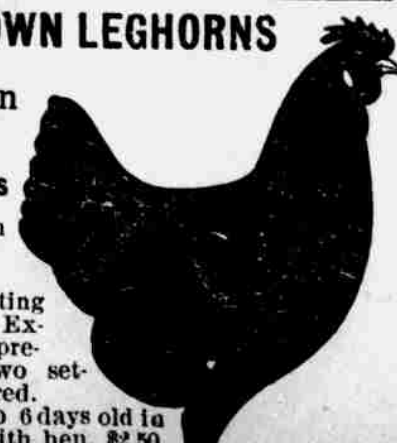
