#### The People's Party in New Jersey.

The state convention of the people's party in New Jersey met in Trenton September 6. J. R. Buchanan of Newark presided, and John W. Hays, general secretary of the K. of L. acted as secretary. A full electoral ticket was named, and a state ticket with Benjamin Bird for governor.
