I take pleasure in answering your request in relation to depositing and loaning county money to the banks. Would say as far as possible the law has been lived up to. There are seven banks in the county, and they each got their share according to their paid up capital stock, and they have each given security accepted by the commissioners. The average amount on deposit is from fifteen to thirty-five thousand. We only get the minimum, that is three per cent. The banks fixed the rate and as there was no opposition, I had to accept the offer. The amount received for the first and second quarters was \$400. That only includes about five months time, as the former treasurer turned the county funds over to me about that time.

The G. O. P. Demoralized in Kansas.

The republican newspapers are generally making extravagant assertions as to the desertions from the people's party. That there are a few, no one questions, but why is it so many republicans are joining the people's party? In the last few weeks Mr. Legate has left the republican column. Chicago Produce Letter—From Summers Morrison & Company.

CHICAGO, Oct. 17, 1892.

Both the produce and fruit trade open this week quite satisfactorily with no material change in the condition of affairs noted last week. There is a sharp demand for all good brands of fresh made butter and prices have advanced some. Best of creamery 26 cents, choice dairy 23 to 24 cents. Fresh eggs are still firm at 20 cents. There is more inquiry for beans and receipts are light. Hand picked \$1.85 to \$1.90 per bushel, machine cleaned \$1.75 to \$1.80. Potatoes are still very firm in price with a good demand on shipping orders. The best well assorted varieties in car lots 65 cents per bushel on track. Fair to good stock 58 to 60 cents, mixed varieties 55 cents. Game is in good demand and but little on sale. Prairie chickens \$4.50 per dozen, partridges \$6 to \$8.50, quail \$2.25 to \$2.50. Ducks of all kinds wanted.

Poultry and veal are both in light supply and and prices a little advanced over last week. Both green and dried apples wanted at good prices. But very little of the new crop of broom corn is yet arriving, in consequence of which receipts meet with ready sale at very good prices.
