The Repulicans Fail to Capture Either House, and Hence Cannot Elect a United States Senator.

A FULL LIST OF THE MEMBERS.

Very Few Democrats Elected-Republicans Gain Some, and Independents Lose.

Summary of the Results.

The returns from the various counties in the state show that the next house will contain The senate will stand: will stand: Republicans...... 62 Independents..... 53

If the independents and democrats pull together they will have a majority of seven on joint ballot.

THE RESULTS ANALYZED.

It is interesting to inquire into the nature and causes of the changes that have occurred since the election of 1890. At first sight it would appear that the republicans have made great gains at the expense of the independents, but a close inspection of the results will show that this is not true to any great extent.

In the last senate the independents had eighteen including the traitors. Taylor and Collins.

Gage county sends a republican in-

stead of Collins. Two years ago in Burt and Coming the independents nominated Beck and the democrats endorsed, and the same was true of Turner of Saline. This year there was a three-cornered fight in Burt and Cuming, and the republicans won. In Saline, the democrats endorsed, but there was a large element of corporation democrats led on by such men as Tobe Castor, who helped the republicans to elect a senator by a small majority.

In Adams the democrats helped elect Hill in 1890, but this year there was a three-cornered fight and the

republicans won.

In York and Fillmore the republicans have gained a senator by main strength from the independents. But the independents have got even by electing H. G. Stewart in the northwest corner of the state which went republican in 1890. Then the republicans have won a senator from the demcrats in Seward and Butler.

In the house the independents have gained from the republicans one member from Richardson, one in Sheridan, Dawes, Box Butte and Sioux, and one in Cherry and Keya Paha. The republicans have gained a number of districts in three-cornered fights, which they lost two years ago, because the democrats endorsed the independent nominations. But the most signal gains of the republicans have been in democratic districts; for instance, seven members from Douglas, two from Cuming, one from Stanton and Wayne, two from Cass, one from Washington.

The plan of the corporations everywhere seems to have been to stand by the republican nominees. While they encouraged the democrats to put up tickets to hold the an i-monopoly democrats in line, they swung the corporation democrats to the republican nominees.
