Chicago Produce Letter—From Summers Morrison & Company.

CHICAGO, Nov. 12, 1892.
 There is no particular change to note in this market since last issue. The most active trading in any one article has been in potatoes. These are still in good demand and all arrivals are absorbed readily. There has not been a season for some years with such a big demand and at fair prices. Choice Burbanks bringing 78 to 80 cents per bushel in car lots. Other good well assorted varieties 74 to 76 cents. Mixed stock 65 to 67 cents. Apples are holding up well in price and all good shipping stock sells readily at \$3 to \$3.25 per barrel. Under continued light receipts of butter the price has advanced and the best makes of creamery are bringing 30 to 31 cents, fair makes 27 to 28 cents. Best makes of dairy 25 to 26 cents. Eggs continue in light supply at 22 to 23 cents. The season for dressed poultry is now on hand and a large amount will be wanted for Thanksgiving.
 Prices rule at present at 8 1/2 to 9 cents for hens, springs 10 cents, turkeys 11 to 12 1/2 cents, ducks 10 to 12 cents. The receipts of game continue light and all arrivals in good order are taken readily at previous quotations. Beans continue in good demand at \$1.90 to \$2 per bushel for hand picked, \$1.75 to \$1.85 for machine cleaned.
 There is a fair demand for the best grades of hay at \$12 to \$12.50 for No. 1 timothy, \$11 to \$11.50 for No. 2 and \$10 to \$11 for mixed timothy. Choice prairie is bringing \$9 to \$10.
 The receipts of broom corn still continue light and all offerings are taken readily at previous prices quoted.
 The grain market is higher all around. Wheat closed at 79 1/2 cents to 73 cents. Corn 41 1/2 cents and oats 31 1/2 cents.

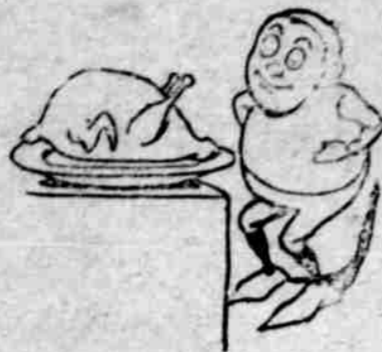
