

Held by Europeans Concerning the Tribe of Judas.

Nearly all European countries formerly observed curious customs which had a bearing on the real or traditionary life of Judas Iscariot. Even to this day, when the ceremony of washing the feet is performed in the Greek church at Smyrns the priest represents Christ and the lower church dignitaries the twelve apostles. The one who personates Judas must, however, be well paid for his menial part, for such is the feeling of the people in regard to the matter that whosoever accepts this odious position usually retains the name the remainder of his life.

In Brazil the churchmen dress up a figure to represent Judas (usually with red hair and sandy beard!) and give it to the street arabs, who carry it about until it has been riddled by stones and other missiles and then burn it on the commons.
