The annual meeting of the Lancaster County Farmers Mutual Insurance company convened on the 12th inst. with Vice President Wm. Nelson of Bennett in the chair.

From the report of the secretary we find that this company had \$158,000 insurance on January 1st, and that the cost to its members for the past year was but \$1 per thousand.

At this rate the cost for five years on \$1,060 would be \$5 or one fourth the amount charged by old line companies on time. The company sustained but one loss of two houses during the year. Amount

An assessment of 10c per \$1000 was made and in less than two weeks the loss was paid. What company could be more prompt.

Only four men are delinquent in paying their assessment. The total amount due from these four was \$1.02.

The secretary was instructed to notify the delinquents that their policy would be cancelled in 30 days if their assessment was not paid and hereafter all who are delinquent 30 days will have their policy cancelled.


