Resolved, That the proper officers should proceed to collect all the state money deposited in the Capital National bank. If it cannot be collected from the bank, then they should collect it from the treasurer and his bondsmen. It has only been a short time since Sherman county lost twenty thousand dollars in the same way and we are getting tired of paying a high rate of taxes to raise funds for rascally bankers to steal: and

Whereas, It has come to our knowledge that a bill has been presented for passage in the house of representatives whereby a bounty of \$1 00 per ton is to be paid to the producers of sugar beets,


