HOW IS WEALTH CREATED?

Allen Root Discusses the Second Question in the Alliance Manual. Editor ALLIANCE-INDEPENDENT:

LEGISLATIVE MATTERS.

It stands the independent members of the legislature in hand to push work of all kinds as rapidly and vigorously as possible. There is an immense amount of unfinished work on hands.

The prospect for getting any valuable measures through the senate is not good. On Tuesday Majors was empowered to appoint a sifting committee. The independents opposed this, but were out-voted by republicans and monopoly democrats.

The passage of the Newberry bill through the house is now assured. Also the Everett bill has been indefinitely postponed in the senate. This seems to leave the field clear for a square fight on the Newberry bill in the senate.

One evening last week Senator Stewart filed a most vigorous protest against the arbitrary rulings of Majors. Early in the session Attorney-General Hastings' friends in both houses introduced resolutions instructing him to help prosecute asylum hoodlars, etc.

Wednesday morning the friends of silver won a signal victory in the senate. The bill making all debts payable in gold, silver or legal tender paper was reported, with the recommendation that it pass, and the report was adopted by a vote of 17 to 14.

Last week the independent senators achieved another signal victory although they had to resort to parliamentary tactics to do it. The republicans had arranged to have the heads of various state institutions appear in open senate, and talk up the appropriations for their respective institutions.
