If this were not so, then the abandoned cities of the plains, Babylon, Petra and Baalbec would be wealthy still. Then we must conclude that natural resources, appropriated and occupied by intelligent labor alone creates wealth. The converse of this proposition is equally frequently terminates in calamity, and almost always in poverty. The genius of invention set in motion by skill, supplemented by labor, originated the tools and implements by the use of which labor creates wealth. By these means the use of two pounds of coal in the most improved engines equals in productive power a mans labor for a day in the creation of wealth.
