Interesting Items Gleaned from People's Party Exchanges.

There are said to be 39,000 idle working men in Chicago.

Sixteen per cent of the population of London live on charity.

Denmark pensions all working people over sixty years of age.

Arizona joins Kansas in giving to women the right of suffrage.

The Denver (Col.) board of trade demands that the state should operate coal mines.

One factory in Frederick county, Md., put up 4,000,000 cans of corn and beans this season.

Dr. McGlynn, the deposed and restored priest, is manfully championing the cause of the poor.

The man who strikes for higher wages and votes to lower them, is very properly reckoned a fool.

Ministers in Binghamton, N. Y., have formed a combine to hold up the price for marrying people.

The California legislature has passed a bill making it a crime to discharge a man for belonging to a union.

The Minnesota senate has passed a memorial calling on congress to take possession of the anthracite coal mines.

The trades council of Melbourne, Australia, has adopted resolutions in favor of state ownership of all coal mines.

The business failures for last week numbered 236. In 1896 the whole number of failures for the year was less than 600.

A number of state legislatures are considering measures taxing inheritances. Minnesota has passed a law of that kind.

Of the \$265,000,000 raised for the Panama canal, only \$90,000,000 were spent for actual work, the balance being stolen.

Norvin Green, the president of the Western Union Telegraph company, is dead; but that monopoly is as healthy and vigorous as ever.

North Dakota isn't anything if it is not impartial. It gave one electoral vote to each of the three leading candidates for president.

A western editor has been convicted of bigamy. We didn't know there was an editor in the country foolish enough to marry two women.

The labor commission of the English parliament has been investigating co-operative industries, and reports them as being highly successful.

Germany has at present sixty-five national trade unions, with nearly 260,000 members; an increase of more than 78,000 during the preceding year.

What a farce the appointment of J. Sterling Morton as secretary of agriculture is. Come to think of it, what a farce that department is any way.

The credentials of Senator elect Martin of Kansas, were accepted and the oath of office administered to him without dissent or notice of contest.

The daily papers are devoting more space to the prospective fight between Corbett and Mitchell than they are to a discussion of the public questions of the hour.

There are more than 50,000 persons in Paris who earn a living by picking up and making use of what other people throw away—rags, bones, metal and such refuse.

Warner Holt of Missouri, a third-class clerk in the pen-ion office, has been dismissed for having stated to a member of congress that pensions were being granted for "baldness."

The Boston Advertiser, a republican newspaper, says: "The republicans in Kansas in the past few days, have been acting in a manner that reflects no credit upon the party in general."

It is going to be pretty hard on the republicans in having to crawl out of their warm nests and hustle for a living, but they will have to do it to make room for the hungry, shivering democrats.

The slowest railroad in the world is the Arizona & New Mexico. From Benson to Nogales is eighty-eight miles, and the schedule time is eight hours. The fare is \$8.50, or ten cents a mile.

The census figures show that West Virginia has more square miles of coal than Great Britain, Germany and France combined, though it stands fifth in point of annual coal production in the United States.

President Harrison has accepted a professorship in the Leland Stanford university of California. He will choose for his topic in the series of lectures, "Constitutional Law." The course will begin October next.

The men who took the places of the Homestead strikers complain bitterly of the miserable pay they are receiving as a result of the treatment that is meted out to them. There won't be much sympathy wasted upon them.

The Hickory Mercury says: Since McKinley has lost \$100,000 by endorsing the notes of his friends, he can now sympathize with millions who have endorsed the views of their enemies; for instance, the high protectionists.

Michael Flurschheim a millionaire manufacturer of Switzerland, has become interested in the socialist colony at Topolobampo Bay. It is said that he will devote a large sum of money to make the scheme a success.

The democratic house of the North Carolina legislature passed a bill recently taking away the charter of the Farmers' Alliance. If the bill becomes a law, its only effect will be to wipe out the democratic party in North Carolina.

When Harrison places a states rights democrat on the supreme bench, and Cleveland selects a republican as premier of his cabinet, the line of demarcation between republicanism and democracy may said to be almost obliterated.

According to statistics by the director of the United States mint, the metallic stocks of the principal banks and treasuries of the United States and Europe for 1892, were in the aggregate as follows: Gold, \$1,529,173,005; silver, \$961,180,597. Total gold and silver, \$2,490,353,603.

The Australian government has announced its intention of spending nearly a million dollars in public works and of building several railroads for the sake of giving work to the unemployed. In Tasmania the unemployed workmen have been hired by the government at five shillings a day.

Governor Shortridge of North Dakota, when asked to become a candidate for senator said: "No, gentlemen. I was elected by the people to be governor of North Dakota for two years. I am in honor bound to keep my contract with the people. I am not a senatorial possibility."

The English miners' convention voted in favor of abolition of overtime, piece-work and child labor; the establishment of forty-eight hours as a legal week's work; the making of provision for the sick and disabled, and for orphans and widows; the collective ownership of land; a vote on suffrage, and the abolition of the house of lords.

It is said that Governor Lewelling of Kansas, before the supreme court decision, was almost daily in receipt of letters threatening him with assassination if he did not recognize the Douglas house. 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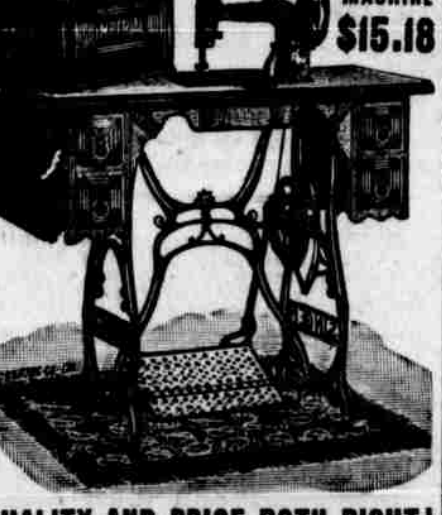
