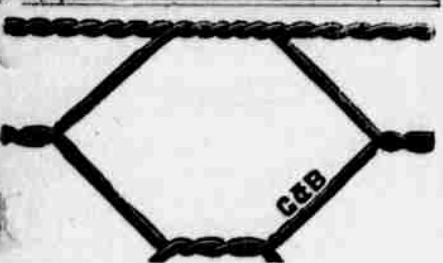

Was the Alliance Leader started as an honorable enterprise? Was it the purpose of its founders to build up a worthy paper on their own merits? Or was it their intention to prey like pirates on the reputation and patronage of an honorable competitor.

Mr. Edgar A. Murray, secretary of this company then called on Mr. Parks and received the same information.

Mr. Mefferd also called on Mr. Parks and made an exact copy of the contract which is here re-produced.

The words printed in bold-face type are the words written in by the agent. The words "accepted ALLIANCE-PUBLISHING CO." were printed
