AVENGING "RED" PALLAS.

Anarchist Cedina Tells the Story of the Campos and Theater Explosions.

BARCELONA, Dec. 26.-Jose Cedina, the anarchist who has already confessed that he threw the bomb that caused upwards of thirty deaths in the Liceo theater, has made a further confession giving details of the crime. Cedina says that he was selected of

an Anarchist group to assassinate General Martinez Campos in September last. In company with two or three comrades, including Pallas, he went to view the march past of the troops, it being then his intention to the reviewing officer. He took a po-sition from which it would have been an easy task to have carried out his project, but when the troops arrived his courage failed him. The reason for this was that he realized that if he threw a bomb amid the vast crowd that surrounded the general he would have killed and wounded hundreds of persons. He had the bomb ready to but the thought of many innocent persons that would suffer restrained him from throwit Pallas, as the time set the assassination drew near, Pallas, as the time set arged him to throw the bomb. Seeing that he hesitated, Pallas angrily snatched the bomb from him saying: "You're no good." Pallas' nerves were evidently unstrung by the wrangle and for a time he hesitated to throw the bomb that he had seized. Had he thrown it as he origi-nally intended, he would have killed General Campos, but the delay which allowed the crowd surging about the reviewing stand to grow thicker saved the life of the general.

Pallas, when arrested, and until he was shot under court martial sentence, insisted that he alone was responsi-ble for the attempted assassination, and despite the close questioning by the authorities, he never by word betraved that Cedina or anyone else had anything to do the crime. It was this fact that made him a hero in in the eyes of the anarchists who knew all the facts. This led Cedina to Pallas's threat that his execution would be avenged. Shortly after Pallas was shot at Mount Juich, Cedina began his preparations to avenge his comrade's death, and the explosion at the Liceo theater fol-

BLUE FOR THE CREDITORS.

The Bank of Greensburg, Kan., in Charge of the State Commissioner. TOPEKA, Kan., Dec. 26. -State Bank Commissioner Breidenthal has taken possession of the Bank of Greensburg. Kiowa county. NO OTHER HOPE FOR LIBERTY.

Free Coinage and Other Remedies But Strip Leaves From an Evil Tree. It Must be Destroyed Root and Branch.

A Careful Thinker's Views.

Before the introduction of steam and improved machinery there was but one class of people living off the product of another man's labor, and that was the land-owning class. All industries were carried on on a small scale. Everything being produced by hand there was no room for great employers, and was bute poor show for capitalism. By such slow process as hand labor there it was impossible for production to overtake consumption and everybody having European conditions. steady employment there was no such pressing need as at present. Steam, electricity and improved machinery being introduced, hand labor had to be done away with, and the greater part of the world's producers were forced to work for those who own the machinery. Instead of getting the full product of their labor they are forced to take such wages as the changed condition of the labor market allows them. With every new labor saving invention thousands of men have been thrown out of employment and the power of the employers to rob their men of more of the products of their labor has increased.

As you see, capitalism is the product of improved machinery, operated by men who are forced to work for considerable less than the value of their products. Capital being unpaid labor, it is impossible for employers to exist unless the workers are willing to work for less than the value of their products, and the aggregate wages of all wageearners not being sufficient to buy onehalf their own products, or the equivalent of their labor value, it is self-evident that they cannot consume more than half as much as they produce, and must thereby be from time to time with. out employment, making a bad thing worse. The very poverty of the working classes prevents their consuming the necessary food stuffs, [and is the cause of the farmers getting poor, and into the clutches of the money-loaner. Cripple capitalism to some extent, and you take away the inducement to invest; because there is some risk in every undertaking. And the laborers depending upon capital for employment will be thrown on the streets by hundreds of thousauds.

Eight hours work, although a necessary will be only a temporary relief, because more labor-saving machinery and increase in the working population will soon more than offset the eight hour advantages. A reduction of hours, not decreasing net profits of capital, no cure is possible that way. So long as the producers of wealth cannot consume the wealth they create, and part of that wealth becomes property of idlers, so long must there be misery and slavery for all the producers.

Free coinage and national railroads would double the prices for farm products and stimulate agriculture to such an extent that the people would force Uncle Sam to irrigate his 100,000,000 acres of irrigable land; and the production in this country alone would in a very few years be sufficient to feed Europe. The introduction of machinery He attended the funeral of in Europe throwing millions of men on getting steady employment or higher wages to make up for dearer necessaries of life, would force Europeans to emigrate by millions every year to any country of the world where land is obtainable, especially to Brazil and Argentine, because these countries provide free transportation, land, seed, and teams to heads of families. And notice, European food market would be lost through emigration of food-consumers; the emigrants would become food producers, and the very panaces ruptcy; and all prosperity would be concentrated in the hands of a few.
