A TERRIFIC SNOW STORM.

THE WHOLE WEST ENSWATHED IN THE BEAUTIFUL.

MANY YEARS. WORST IN

A Furious Blizzard Sweeps the Country From New Mexico to Ohio-A Terrific Blizzard in Chicago and at Other Places-In Kansas and Missouri-Other Storm News From Various Points.

CHICAGO, Feb. 13 .-- A blizzard of the most approved pattern, with snow, sleet and an energetic wind, swept down on Chicago last night and to-day raged with constantly increasing violence. Great snow drifts blocked the streets, suburban trains were delayed and snow sweepers were kept incessantly in use to prevent stoppage of the street car lines, traffic on which was badly delayed.

The blizzard is the most severe that has visited Chicago for many years. At noon the wind was blowing at the rate of seventy miles an hour with indications that the storm would continue through the day and night with incoming trains were from an hour to globe. two hours late and the roads were becoming more blocked all the time.

The wind rushed around the down town corners with terrific force, carrying pedestrians off their feet and injuring many. Mrs Jane Brahany was hurled against a fire plug near Dearborn and Van Buren streets and fatally injured. Many carriages on Michigan avenue, where the wind swept straight off the lake, were overturned but none of the occupants were seriously injured. Lake Michiand swept clear across the Illinois Central railway tracks into the Lake

The storm was general all over Illinois and Iowa and telegrams received eate that it prevailed over that sec-tion. Keokuk, Burlington and Quiney report street car traffic all stopped, and trains from the northwest are

Reports received here from points in Southern Illinois, Southern and Central Indiana, Missouri in general and Arkansas give the same storythe heaviest snow of the season, with wind in a majority of cases drifting the deposit badly. Fort Smith, Ark., reports rising streams with rail and wagon roads suffering thereby. In some instances trains are very badly delayed, some being four or five hours, and even more, late.

The promise now is of a very sharp drop in temperature, which will turn ent slush to ic ituation even worse than it is now.

MISSOURI AND KANSAS. Both States Enswathed in the Mazes the Beautiful.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Feb. 12.-The snow that began to fall half heartedly about 8 o'clock yesterday morning, came down in earnest at noon and at 8 o'clock this morning there was sixteen inches of snow on a level and in places there were drifts four to five feet deep.

Last night railways were utterely helpless and useless, street railways could not be operated at all. The air was not cold. The thermometer here ranged at 14 degrees above zero from 8 o'clock yesterday morning to 8 today. The wind blew in an undecided sort of way, sometimes seeming to come from the west, again apparently from the north, and shifting around big buildings and along narrow streets, drifting the snow in places to an impassable depth. Saturday the signal service an-

nounced probable snows in Missouri and Kansas, and Mr. Connor, the observer here, said to-day that the extent of the storm did not surprise him at all. "There was a low," he said, "out near Salt Lake City Saturday and it came sneaking around through New Mexico and past El Paso. It extended over Eastern Kansas, Nebraska, 10wa, Oklahoma, Northern Texas and to-day the Northern Arkansas and to-day the same storm that paid its respects to Kansas City all night long, is doing the same thing in St. Louis. Rain fell there yesterday. Snow fell in Western Kansas and Colorado all day Saturday and the storm proceeded gradually eastward and is now heading toward Chicago and the lakes.

The center of the storm area at 8 o'clock this morning was Cairo, Ill., the storm being most severe at that point, and gradually diminishing all around that city. The center yester-day was near Fort Scott, Kan.

CLINTON, Mo., Feb. 12 .- A snow storm struck this vicinity last night and the snow will average twelve inches deep and is badly drifted delaying trains considerably. The thernometer stands twenty-four above.

Ss. Joseph, Mo., Feb. 12.-The storm which reached here yesterday morning continued all night and the snow is almost a foot and a half on the level. Trains are delayed and some that were due early this morning are not in yet.

Nonnonne, Mo., Feb. 12 .- All this section is snow bound and the heavy wind makes traffic almost impossible.

THURSTON LECTURES.

The Hawaiian Minister Speaks on the Future of Hawaii.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 13. - Minister Thurston addressed a large audience here last night in the M. E. church on Hawaii and its future and was greeted with great applause, when he referred indirectly to annexation. He said, in beginning his address, that he was invited to come there, if only to show himself as one of those Hawaiians who were in danger of having their cut off. Hawaii, he heads continued, is not so far away from civilization as many people imagine, as a matter of fact, it is nearer the geographical center of the earth than Washingt n. The Alcutian islands extended out in the Pacific ocean 1.000 miles east of Hawaii, making San Francisco the geographical center of this country, so Honolulu is 1.000 miles nearer the Golden Gate than Washington.

Hawaii, he declared, is a child of the United States if ever any country was the child of another. Americans found the islands inhabited by a people one step advanced from barbarism, formulated and framed the language and introduced and arranged laws modeled after those of the United States.

From a religious point of view the Hawalians set a good example of brotherly love among denominations, for all the Protestants there worshipped in one church. Even the 5,000 Mormons there are not polygamists.


