Nebraska's fiftieth legislature got off to a flying start last week with more than a score of bills introduced, whereas in previous sesstions bills have not been introduced until the second week. Headlining the first batch of bills is S. F. 4, introduced by Rolla C. Van who seeks to create a state police force of not more than 100 nor less enforcement in Nebraska.


