Licensing power is vested in a state commission of three members to be appointed by the governor, do with His claims? no two of whom shall be members of the same political party.

Separate licenses for the sale of beer and hard liquor by the drink are authorized.

Issuance of "on sale" and "off sale" liquor licenses for the same premises, or adjoining premises, forbidden. The only exception is for "large buildings" or hotels accommodating at least 150 guests,

On sale liquor licenses in cities under 25,000 to cost \$300, in large cities \$400.

Cities and towns may levy ocupation taxes equal to the state icense tax, but no more.

Near beer would be subject to the same regulations as full strength beer, and no spiking would be permitted.
