The public hearings will be sponsored by Nebraska's newly created state planning board, and worthwhile projects which could utilize federal works funds will be considered.

The governor has appointed a 13member commission to consider the proposed national parks area on the Oregon and Mormon trails, extending from Bridgeport to old Ft. Laramie in Wyoming. This section of the state already has a national monument in the form of the Scottsbluff project. FERA officials and the people of the Scottsbluff area are now considering ways and means whereby Ellis Burman, youthful Lincoln sculptor, can be retained to prepare a huge Indian statue to be mounted on a promitory on the national monument. Burman has completed one Indian Statue group and is preparing a 15-foot Indian statue which will be placed in a Lincoln park, all of this work being done as a FERA "white collar" work project.
