FOR BUILDING NEW COURT HOUSE HERE

Request A Grant of Three Fourths of Cost of New Building and Three Blocks of Paving.

Mayor John Kersenbrock, W. H.

The first proposition submitted was the paving of Fourth street from the corner of Douglas street three blocks north to Adams street. They made application for 75 per cent of the estimated cost of the paving, which has been estimated at \$25,000, the balance to be paid by the city and county.

If this paving is laid it will be in front of a block of ground owned by the county and a block owned by the O'Neill school district, on which are located the court house and the O'Neill public school. On the other side of the street is a block of ground owned by St. Patrick's parish and nearly a half block owned by the Sisters of St. Mary's academy and used as a playground. The other half of the block is the site of the new federal building. The other block is owned by individuals.

The other proposition submitted by the O'Neill delegation was a request for \$110,00 for a new court house. The present building has practically outlived its usefulness. Hauptman Gets Death For Lindberg Kidnaping

After a little over eleven hours of deliberation the jury trying Bruno Richard Hauptmann for the kidnap-murder of Charles A. Lindberg, jr., returned a verdict of ric chair. This morning Judge Blanchard sentenced him to die in the chair the week of March 18.

The jurors verdict of guilty, with no recommendation for mercy, compelled Judge Trenchard to prothe jury recommended mercy a sentence of life imprisonment would have been mandatory. After the verdict was rendered

the jurors disclosed that on the the jury, which was composed of four women and eight men, voted guilty. Then the next ballot taken resulted in a vote of eight to four, four voting to recommend mercy and eight against. On the fourth ballot the verdict was unanimous without recommendation.
