The idea is to make Nebraskans socially secure (or as one of the more cynical observers say: "Make Nebraska secure for socialists") but the lawmakers along with everyone else appear to have very little conception of what it is all about.

The one all-impelling thought behind the social security legislation is that Nebraska will lose out on several millions of federal funds if laws are not passed to put the state in line with the federal security act.
