Those farms with a percentage of soil conserving crops and practices below the county average will be in one group. Other farms where the percentage of soil conserving crops and practices is above the county average will be in another group.

The farm in the group with less than the county average of soil conserving crops and practices will begin with the percentage which it had in 1935. A farm in the group with more than the county average percentage of soil conserving crops and practices will begin at the county average.

The secretary of agriculture will request a percentage change from soil depleting to soil conserving crops and practices. Farmers who make this change will be paid at a the community committee. The maximum payment will be the percentage of change requested by the secretary times the rate of pay established by the committee.

The farmer who is above the farming practice. Details of these payments will be explained at the community meetings.

As soon as the county average figure is announced, the percentage of change is requested by the secretary, and the list of soil conserving crops and practices is available, his 1936 crops accordingly if he wants to take part in the program.
