The predecessor of the modern stacker and hay sweep were devised and first put to practical use in that same community. The first "horseless carriage" in Holt county was the handiwork of an O'Neill jeweler, B. F. Cole. It consisted of the running gear of a buggy with a platform to which sails were attached. The wind fanned regularly and no fences interfered. A few trips were made with this contrivance into the South Fork valley where its inventor had a claim.
