The use of federal vocational education funds to subsidize sweat shops has been made more difficult, if not impossible, by restrictions placed on this appropriation bill by the house committee. By unanimous vote, the committee decreed used for low wage employment-a practice that has been quite extensive.

Diversion of federal vocational education funds in several southern states, particularly in Mississippi, has caused the United States Bureau of Education to raise its regulations.
