Second Pair of Twin Draft Colts Born in U. S.



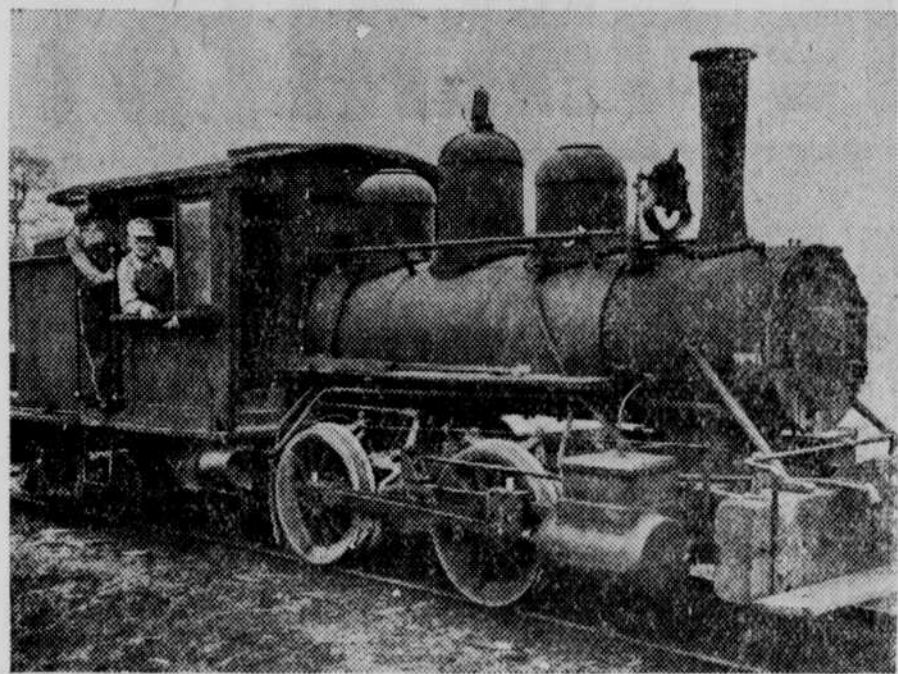
Parents Are Grand Champion Belgian Horses

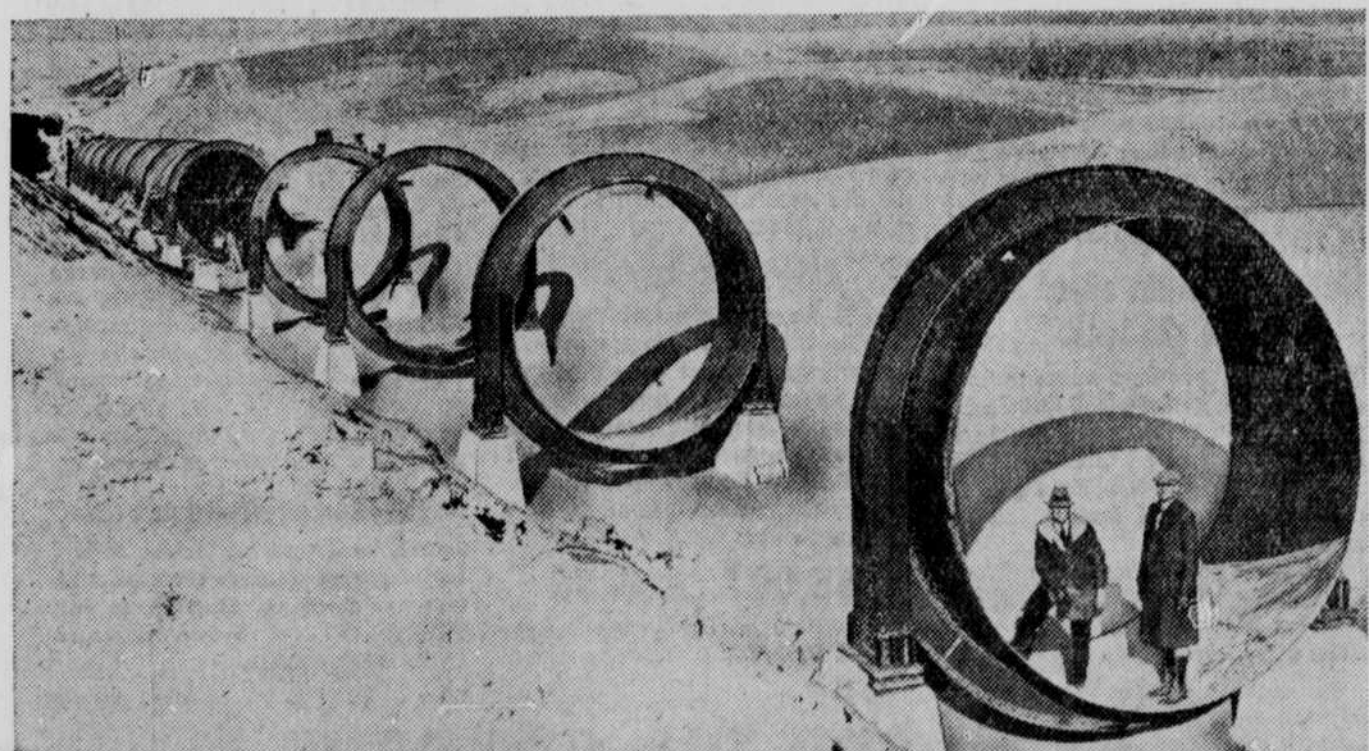

Building Great Power Conduit of Platte Valley



These giant hoops are part of the power conduit of the \$7,500,000 Platte valley development being undertaken by the Public Works administration. The huge power tunnel will be suspended in these circular steel girders. The project will include a 25,000 KVA hydro-electric plant, 220 miles of transmission lines, two reservoirs and 75 miles of canals for irrigation of arid Nebraska lands.

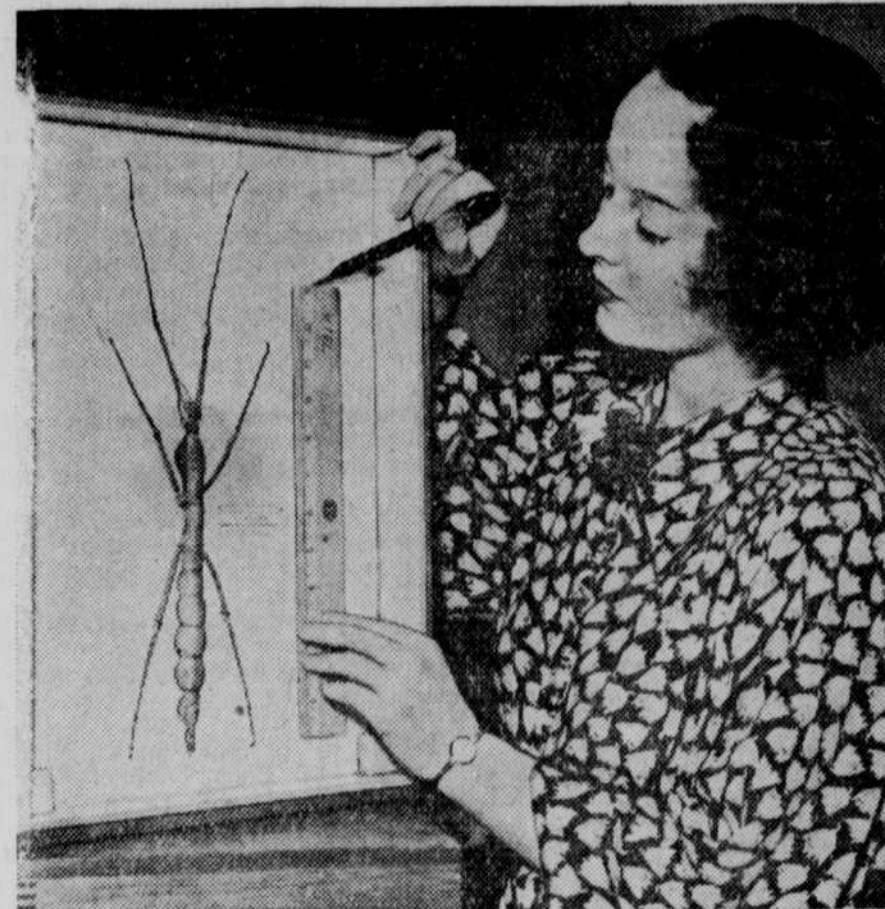
Brig. Gen. Gilmore Is Executive of San Francisco Fair

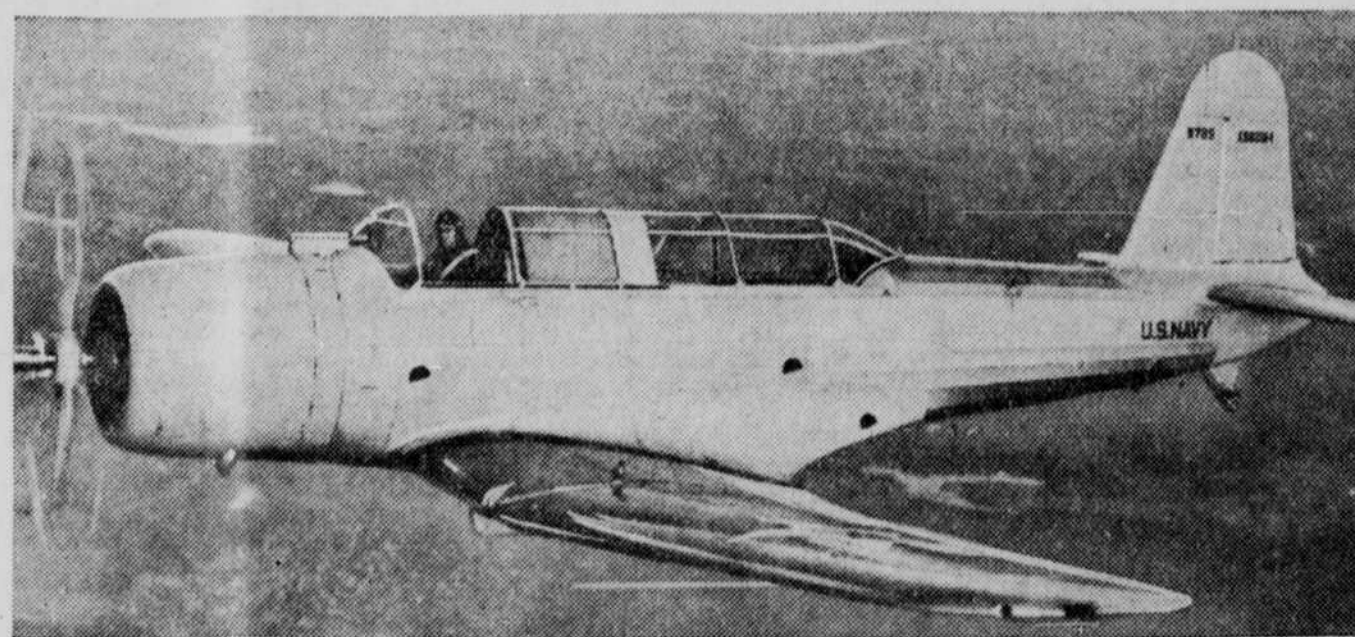

New Scout Bomber Tried Out by the Navy

The plane was constructed by Chance Vought Aircraft for the United States navy and was shipped to the naval air station at Anacostia, D. C., for competitive tests.
