Agricultural Division to Work With Township Committees.

Chicago.-Practical farmers will take an active part in directing the Republican campaign in rural areas, Congressman Clifford D. Hope of Garden City, Kas., announced in assuming the directorship of the Farm Division of the Republican National Committee.

In each agricultural state, an advisory council is to be set up. This council is to be composed of practical "dirt" farmers who will supply the basic suggestions for the

campaign. Three assistant directors have been appointed to aid Congressman Hope. They are Don L. Berry of Indianola, Iowa, publisher of the Indianola Record; E. H. Taylor of Yates Center, Kansas, for 12 years assistant editor of The Country Gentleman, and Congressman Francis D.
