This tax will be increased by one per cent next year, and another one per cent in 1938, reaching a maximum of 3 per cent of all payrolls, to be paid entirely by em-

That is one phase of the social security act - the employment phase. The other phases have to do with old age insurance.

The tax for this starts on Jan. 1 and will amount to 2 per cent of all payrolls. Half of this will be paid by employers, and the other half by employes.
