Economic Highlights

A major political party can survive a long period of defeat of its Presidential candidates - as the Democratic party, which didn't even get close to control of the White House in 1920, 1924 and 1928, so vividly demonstrates today.

But can a major party survive an election in which its officeholders-who are the sole source of the patronage that is so vital to any political machine-are reduced to the lowest number in history?

That question is now being considered privately by Republican leaders-and publicly by principally all the country's publicists and political columnists.

Under the American elective system, a party can receive a respectable popular vote and still be out in the cold when the time comes for calling the roll in Congress, state legislatures and municipal councils. That is what happened to Republicans in the debacle of 1936. Governor Landon polled around 37 per cent of the popular vote-yet received only 11/2 per cent of the Electoral College vote. Republican candidates thruout the country polled about 17,000,000 votes as against about 27,000,000 for the Democrats-yet they were victorious in only a microscopic proportion of the contests.

Best example of this is the House of Representatives. It was universally conceded before Nov. 3, that the Republicans would make gains, irrespective of who won the Presidency. Democratic spokesmen said hopefully that these gains would not amount to more than 20 or 30 seats, while Republicans claimed they would gain well over
