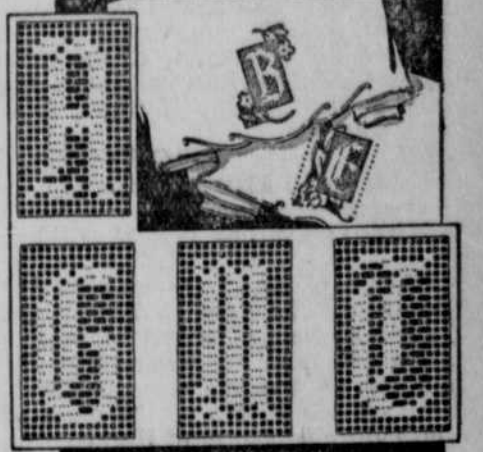

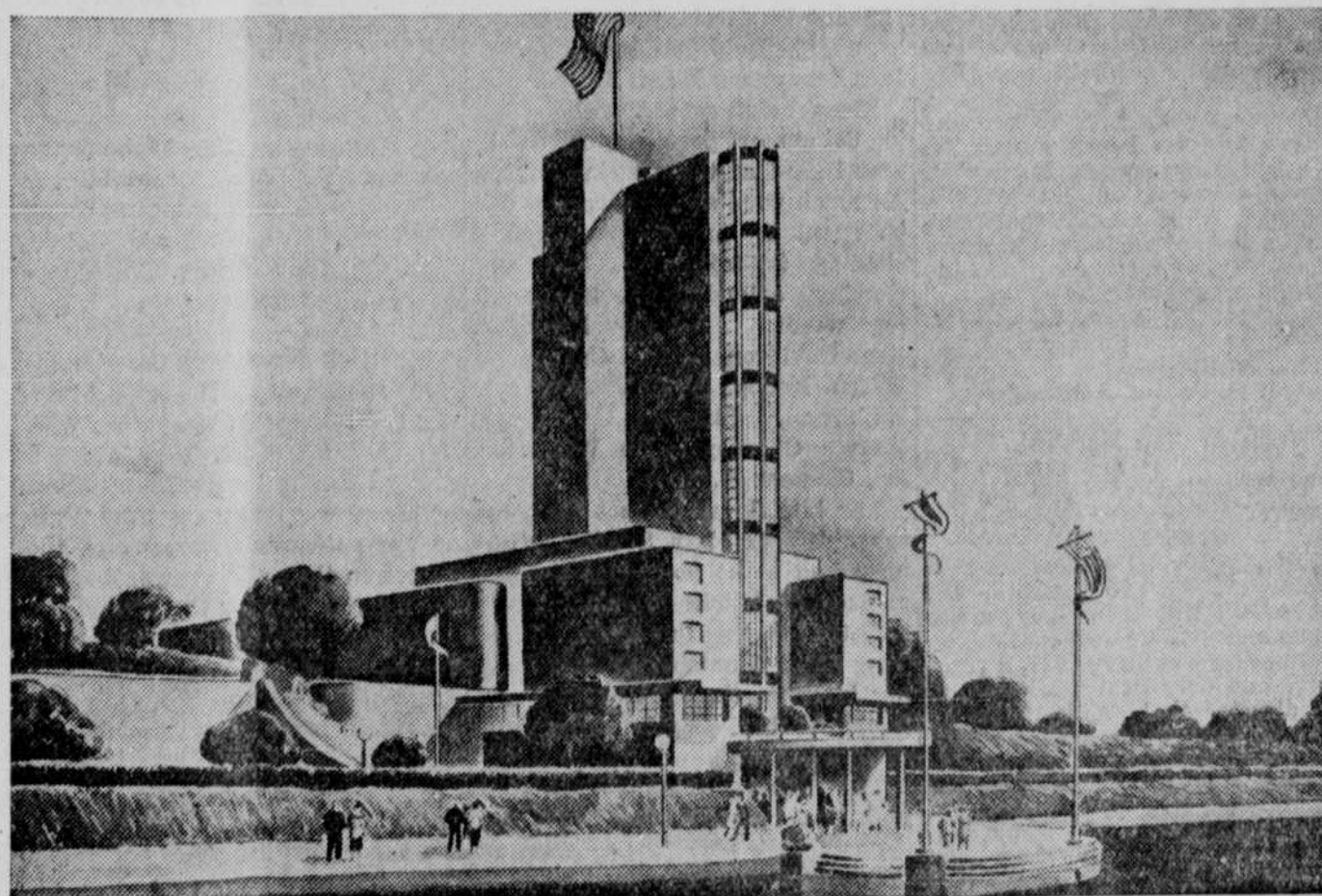

Queen of Dogdom and Her Trophies



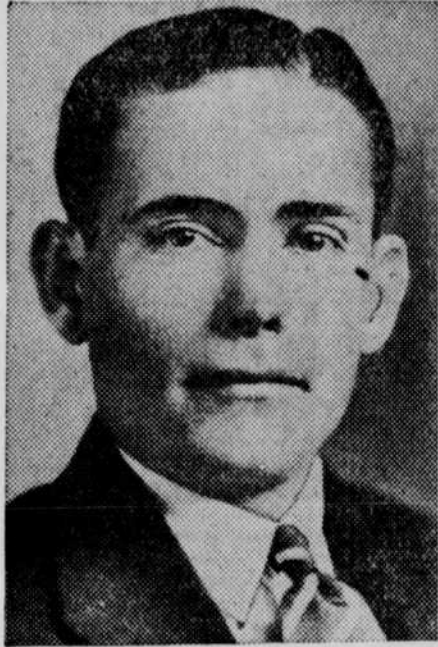

RESCUED FROM MINE



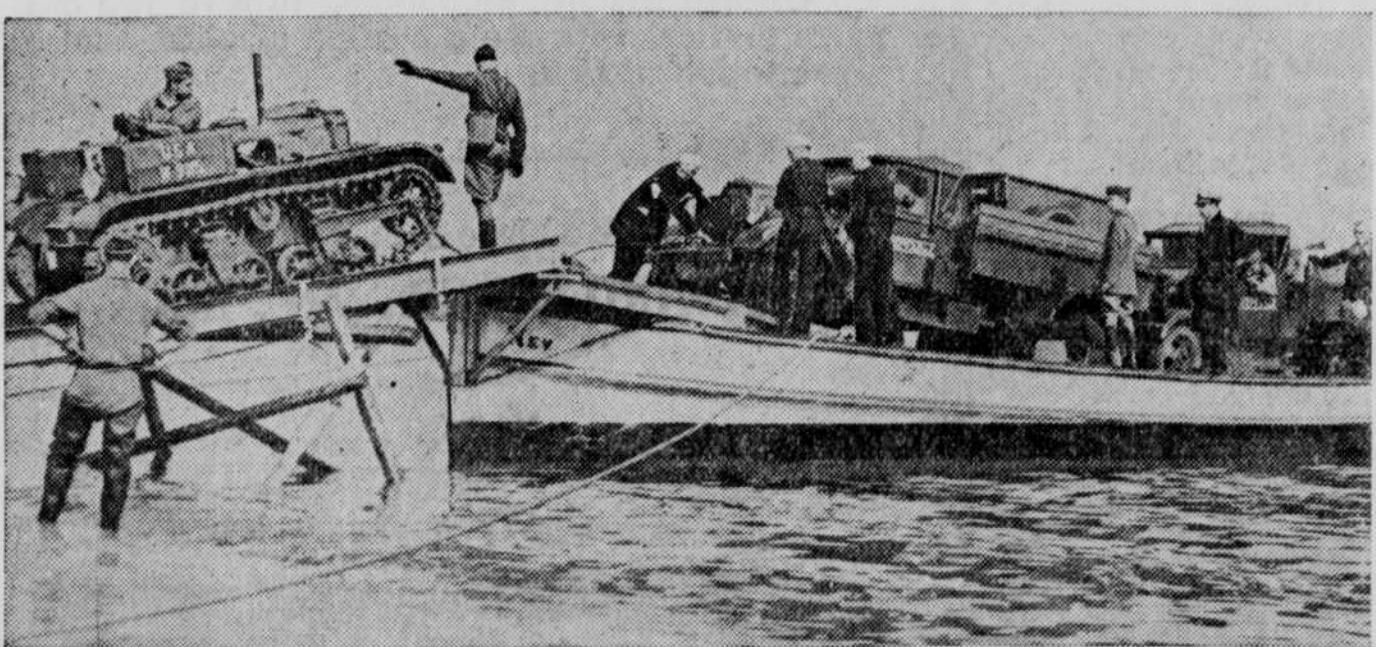
