> Proposed Public School Aid Hearings on the bill to give fed-

eral aid to the various states for public school education have taken up most of the week by members of the House Committee on Education. \$ 97,361,72 The bill calls for an outright grant of one hundred million dollars to 196,041.00 the various states for education the 94,345.13 first year, and to this fund is to be added fifty million dollars a year until the total amount has reached three hundred million dollars. Under the proposed legislation, the Federal government would have nothing to say about the expenditure of the money except that it go to public schools and be spent by the state governments. The bill is sponsored by the National Educa-\$330,149.27 tion association and many school boards and school teachers. It is 119,086.00 given the endorsement of the Nebraska superintendent of public Instruction and many Nebraska educators. The proponents of the measure are here in large numbers and are led by high officials of the N. E. A. Many state superintendents and many eudcational experts have already testified in favor of the bill. The claim is that many states, especially those in the south, where there is a large negro population, can no longer raise enough money by taxation to meet the needs of education. 
