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### Across The Kitchen Table

boiling water, one-third cup cooking fat, and flour.

Rub the meat with the salt. Pound all the flour possible into the steak. Sear in hot fat and add the water. Cover. Simmer slowly until the meat is tender. If desired, 1 cup of tomatoes can be substituted for the water, or 1/2 cup of water may be used with the browned steak and 1 cup sour cream added after 30 minutes cooking is completed. Now, how's that? Three different ways of fixing swiss steak.

Shank or shin is boney and gristly and may be used for soup or stew. Chuck or clod (part of the chuck) may be used as pot roast, braised beef, casserole dishes or boiled.

**Creole Combo**

1 pound brisket, diced; 2 1/2 cups okra, 1 bay leaf, 3 sprigs chopped parsley, one-third cup cooking fat, 1/2 onion, chopped, 1/2 pound ham, diced; 2 cups canned tomatoes, 6 cups boiling water, 2 tablespoons flour, salt, pepper and cayenne, and 1 green pepper chopped.

Brown the ham and brisket in cooking fat. Remove meat. Brown the onion and okra in hot fat. Add flour slowly. Stir until blended. Add meat and remaining ingredients, stirring constantly. Season to taste. Cover. Simmer slowly until meat is tender. Serve hot with steamed rice. This serves 12 people. If your family is not large cut the recipe down.

The rump is solid meat, juicy and of good flavor. Use as pot roast, braised, stewed or boiled.

**Pot Roast**

3 pounds of rump, chuck or shoulder; one-third cup suet, 1/2 cup hot water, salt and pepper and flour.

Rub the meat with flour, salt and pepper. Melt the suet in a heavy kettle or dutch oven. Add meat. Sear. Add water. Cover tightly. Cook slowly about 4 hours or until tender. More water will be used if necessary. This will serve eight people nicely.

The upper portion of the atch-bone is solid meat, good quality. Use it as a roast, braised or stewed. The upper portion of the round is fairly tender. Use the round as roast, pot roast or steak.

**Braised Beef**

3 pounds chuck, round or shoulder, one-third cup suet, 2 tablespoons chopped onion, 2 cups diced potatoes, 1/2 cup boiling water, salt and pepper, 3 cups diced carrots, 1 cup cooked tomatoes and flour.

Rub the meat with salt, pepper and flour. Melt suet in heavy kettle. Add meat. Sear. Add water. Cover. Cook slowly until the meat is tender. Add vegetables. Cook until tender. This will serve eight people.

The brisket may be either fat or lean meat of coarse quality. Use it boiled, stewed, in soups, corned or as pot roast.

**Steaked Spaghetti**

1/4 pound cheese, grated; 1 large onion, chopped; 1 pound round steak, have your butcher grind it. 1 1/2 cups tomato saup, 2 cups chopped green peppers, 2 cups cooked spaghetti or macaroni. Salt and pepper.

Combine the cheese, onion, soup, steak, peppers, and spaghetti or macaroni. Season to taste. Mix thoroughly. Pour into a baking dish. Bake in moderate oven of 375 degrees for about 45 minutes. Serves six.
