SUNDAY CLOSING UP AGAIN

Union Barbers Have Ordinance Introduced Before City Commission.

IMPOSES PENALTY AND FINE

Fight Started and Lost by the Barbers Two Years Ago is Renewed When Kugel Introduces the Bill.

Renewal of the campaign to force the closing of barber shops on Sunday was begun before the city commission when Commissioner A. C. Kugel, at the request of the Barbers' union, introduced an ordinance making it a misdemeanor, punishable by fine or imprisonment, or both, to do any barber work on the Sabbath.

The ordinance provides: "It shall be unlawful for any person to be found on the first day of the week, commonly called Sunday, performing any of the duties or services of a barber. Provided, that this shall not be construed

as prohibiting any person from performing such services upon themselves or a member of their family."

Without discussion the ordinance was referred to the committee of the whole for discussion. The penalty for violation is a fine of from \$5 to \$25, or imprisonment not exceeding thirty days, or both. Nearly two years ago the barbers of the union made a strong appeal for Sunday closing and losing the fight before the council attempted to enforce the ruling through the years with little success.
