All other counties are below 20. Sloux county reports but two deaths. Loup, three; Keya Paha and Thomas four each. The total for the state is given at 11,354.

Organic diseases of the heart were responsible for 967 deaths, pneumonia, 855; cerebral hemorrhage, apoplexy, 572; tuberculosis of the luns, 340; Bright's disease, 856; senility, 694. Different kinds of cancer caused the death of 615 persons. Alcoholism carried off fifty-six, smallpox, eight; whooping cough, thirty-four; appendicitis and typhilitis, 143; typhold fever, 107. Suicide by poisoning seemed to be the most popular method of leaving this earth by suicide route, fifty people selecting that way of doing it. Other methods were hanging, thirty-four; shooting, thirty-seven, while twenty-eight used different means than any of the above. Accidental poisoning took away twenty-five and accidental drowning forty-one. Deaths resulting from automobile accidents are given as twenty-eight, by firearms, fifty-five, and by rallway trains, vehicles, etc., sixty-six. Twenty-six died from exerasive cold and thirteen from exessive heat. Four hundred and eighteen infants were still born. Tornadoes claimed 158 victims and lightning nine.

Claims for Reserve Banks. SEVERAL HEARINGS TO BE HELD

Only Fourteen Places Will Be Visited in Addition to Washington -Number Has Not Yet Been Decided Upon.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 28.-The federal reserve bank organization committee tonight supplemented its plan for locating federal reserve cities with an unofficial announcement pointing the way for all cities to present their claims for banks. Before the committee, consisting of Secretary of the Treasury McAdoo and Secretary of Agriculture Houston, starts upon its tour of the country, it will advise Clearing House associations and Boards of Trade in cities that are in the field for a reserve bank when they can

Only fourteen cities, in addition to Washington, will be visited, but it was the understanding tonight that any city and any community can be heard at some point on the trip around the country, which has been mapped out.

Although details for the hearings have not been worked out, it is probable that the claims of Baltimore, Philadelphia and great central valleys about Thursday and Washington will be heard here.
