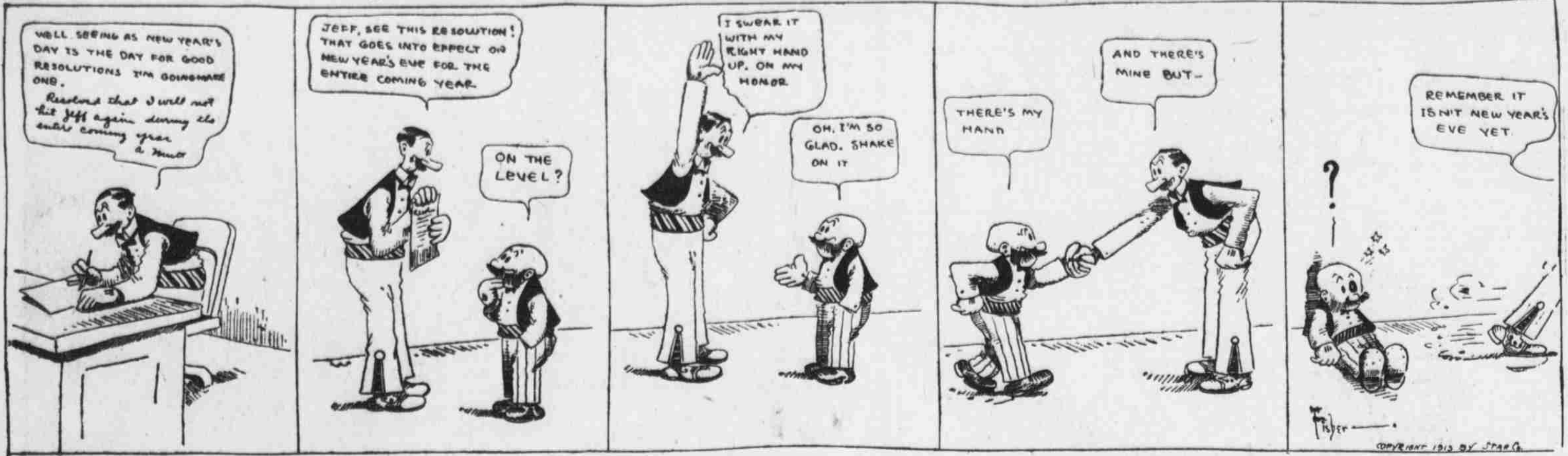

WOLGAST DEBATS REDMOND

Former Lightweight Champion Captures Bout.

GO STOPPED BY THE REFEREE

Contest halted when Milwaukee Man Shows to Be Clearly Outclassed and Without Chance to Win.

MILWAUKEE, Wis., Jan. 1.—Ad Wolgast of Cadillac, Mich., former lightweight champion pugilist, defeated Jack Redmond, Milwaukee, in five rounds of a ten-round boxing contest this afternoon.

Referee Harry Stout stopped the contest about the middle of the fifth round, when Redmond was clearly shown to be outclassed and without any chance to win.

The first two rounds were rather tame, but Wolgast from the beginning of the third, had matters his own way. Redmond was bleeding from the mouth in the fourth round. In the fifth Wolgast drove several hard left jolts to the body and a right uppercut to the jaw, when the referee stopped the fight.

Secretary of Giants Says Federal League Will Lose Money

NEW YORK, Jan. 1.—Railroad fare will quickly eat up the capital of the Federal league in the opinion of Secretary John B. Foster of the Giants.

"The jumps in the Federal league will be longer than those in the National league," asserted Secretary Foster in a statement yesterday, "and railroads and hotels eat up a big part of the profits. It costs \$1,000 to take the New York team to St. Louis under the arrangement now in vogue, and Kansas City is a night's ride beyond St. Louis, so the Federals can figure on spending considerable money for transportation. If they get a number of major league players for whom they are sending them must expect to visit only the best hotels as well.

"The Giants, always fighting for the lead and with the prestige of having won two successive pennants, failed to realize anything on their western trips last season. Can you imagine what the Federals may expect from Chicago and St. Louis when the Giants could not make money in those two cities combined. Furthermore, the Giants went through the month of September during the last pennant race, with the team in first place, a money loser."

Ban Johnson Starts For French Lick, Ind.

CHICAGO, Jan. 1.—President B. B. Johnson and Secretary Harridge of the American league left for French Lick, Ind., today, where they will meet Barney Dreifuss of the Pittsburgh National league team and Secretary Heydler of the National league and prepare the playing schedules of 1914 for the National and American league clubs. The work will take several days.

President Johnson said the American league season would open April 14 and probably will close October 7. The National league season will open April 14 and probably will close about October 5.

OMAHA GIANT KNOCKED OUT BY LEVINSKY

NEW YORK, Jan. 1.—Batting Levinsky, a light heavyweight of this city, knocked out Tom Daly, the Omaha giant, this afternoon in the second round of what was to have been a ten-round bout. Levinsky easily outclassed his opponent in the opening round, when he sent in two lefts to the stomach. In the second round he doubled Day up with a hard smash to the stomach and the Omaha man was out for five minutes. Daly outweighed Levinsky by forty-eight pounds.

Ed Harrison, owner of Duchess, was awarded a silver cup on account of this dog winning the greatest number of points in the meet.

NEW YORK, Jan. 1.—"Sapper" O'Neill, the English lightweight, outpointed Johnny Harvey of this city in a ten-round bout here today. Young Fox, also of England, proved too clever for Kid Herman, a bantamweight from Pekin, Ill., in another bout which went to the ten-round limit.
