body which may eventually be driven across at Presidio. The requirements of humanity are fully met. All civilian refugees, men, women and children and all wounded persons are received and cared for. All armed men who seek

asylum are received, disarmed and cared for. All armed men, who don't evidently seek asylum and whose good faith is in doubt are also disarmed. "If humanity prevails sending them over the river we take care of them. If humanity does not forbid and we can send the men back to join their own army, the local officer acts according to his best discretion." The gunboat Yorktown, en route from San Diego to Mazatlan on the west coast of Mexico, reported its arrival today at Ensenada on the bay of Todos Santos. Americans in Ensenada asked for a warship.

ing for us are entitled to every possible consideration and it would have been rank ingratitude for the companies to have promised them our protection and then asked them to labor alongside members of the Western Federation. There is no doubt that constant trouble would have resulted between the men, with all sorts of cases of violence and reprisals. This was a condition which we could not and would not overlook. "Then, too, anything less than elimination of the Western Federation from the district would have meant that within five years, if not sooner, we should have had all the work to do over again. There was no doubt in the minds of any of us that the first work that the federation members left in the mines would do would be to spread a profusion of dis-

sent, follow it up with a series of unreasonable demands and then start another strike.

Notes from McCook. McCOOK, Neb., Jan. 4.—(Special).—Under the law requiring engines to be equipped with electric headlights, the McCook division has already provided thirty-five of its engines out of a total of sixty-four locomotives with these new headlights. Some difficulty has been experienced in getting the machines on account of the unusual demand being made upon the manufacturers. The price is \$200 each, and it will cost the Burlington about \$15,000 to equip its locomotives thus on the McCook division alone.

LINCOLN MAKES BIG SHOWING

Clearings Last Year More Than Ten Million Gain Over 1912.

FIRE DAMAGE IS CUT HEAVILY

Building Permits Amount to Many Hundreds of Thousands More Than for Preceding Period of Time.

(From a Staff Correspondent.) LINCOLN, Jan. 4.—(Special).—Notwithstanding the condition of the crops in this section of the country last season, the showing made by the capital city at Nebraska for 1913 was exceedingly good and in most instances an increase made over previous years.

The bank clearings for last year showed an increase over the year before of \$10,775,771, the total being \$101,004,607. The bank deposits increased nearly \$1,000,000 and are given as \$11,000,111. Receipts at the postoffice increased from \$381,704 to \$463,300; postal bank deposits from \$20,724 to \$55,000. The fire loss was only \$67,750, as compared with \$100,282 in 1912.

Building permits amounted to \$2,048,000 last year, as against \$1,573,835 the year before and city construction work increased nearly \$100,000. Attendance at the state university is given as 2,752 in 1913, as against 3,506 in 1912. Nearly \$100,000 worth of paving was done last year in excess of the year before.

FREMONT MAN LEAVES MANY CHILDREN OUT OF WILL

FREMONT, Neb., Jan. 4.—(Special).—Samuel W. O'Brien, a well known character about town, is dead at the age of 53, leaving an estate of \$60,000. He had had three wives and a large number of children. His first wife, who got a divorce from him twenty-five years ago, has been for several years an inmate of the Dodge county poor farm. She was the mother of twelve of his children. The second one is dead and the third divorced. He was always in litigation and changed attorneys with most every suit. It is understood that one-third of his property is willed his youngest son and two-thirds to a granddaughter, and only a part of his children are mentioned in his will.

TAKEN TO PENITENTIARY FOR FRAUDULENT DEAL

PAWNEE CITY, Neb., Jan. 4.—(Special).—H. C. Burwell, alias Charles Barber, was taken to Lincoln to the state penitentiary yesterday morning in the custody of Sheriff Raper of Pawnee county. Burwell confessed to engineering the loan deal by which William Jones, a Pawnee county farmer, is alleged to have been swindled out of \$2,500 a few months ago. William Howard, who was implicated in the crime with Burwell, is still at large.

Paroling Prisoners Saves State Over Three Thousand

LINCOLN, Jan. 4.—(Special).—According to a report prepared by Secretary Shahan of the State Board of Charities, ninety-one prisoners at the state penitentiary were let out on parole for the last six months of 1913. Of this number four were returned for violating the terms of their parole and ten escaped. Seven returned to their own farms and took up the work that had been left when they became inmates of the Nebraska prison. Two more are out on account of severe illness and one on account of a broken leg.

William Flege Will Be Placed on Trial Today at Pender

PENDER, Neb., Jan. 4.—(Special).—The third trial of William Flege of Dixon county, who is charged with the murder of his sister, Louise, on June 20, 1910, will begin in district court here tomorrow. From the fact that the case was tried here in 1912 it is believed that several days may be necessary to secure a jury. Both the defense and state have been very active in preparation for the trial. Additional counsel on both sides have been procured and it is believed a most vigorous trial and warm contest of the very important case is yet to come.

ORR SEES GOVERNOR: REPLIES TO CRITICISM

LINCOLN, Jan. 4.—(Special).—Governor Morehead has at times criticized the work at the state orthopedic hospital, or rather the management of the institution by Dr. Lord of Omaha and Dr. Orr of Lincoln, and yesterday the latter called on the governor and attempted to show the executive that he was mistaken in his diagnosis of the case. Dr. Orr informed the governor that most of the criticism of the management of the hospital came from those who have not perfect information regarding the matters they criticize and invited the governor to come out to the hospital and see for himself. Criticism of the action of the doctors in taking private patients to the hospital has been made to some extent and the Board of Control has ordered a dissection of the practice.

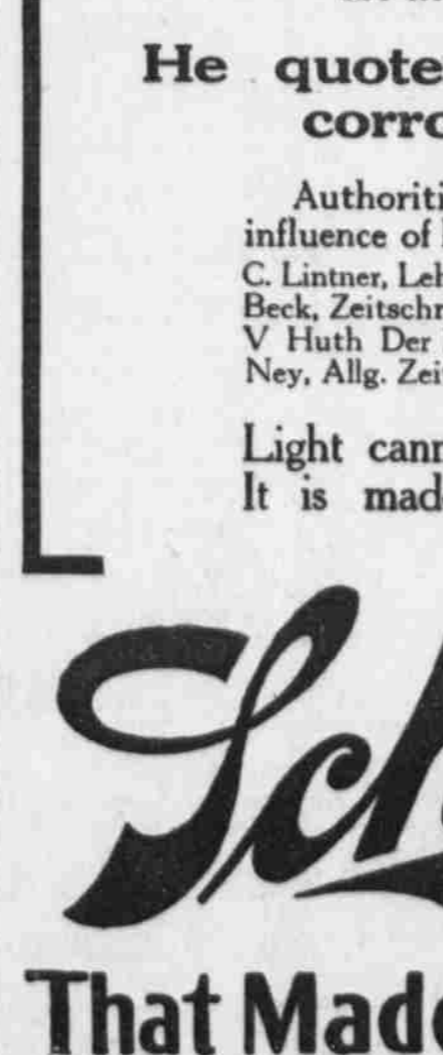
