MOYER GOES BACK TO HANCOCK TO TESTIFY BEFORE GRAND JURY

(Continued from Page One.)

The assertions made by union representatives yesterday. Attorney Hesse, chief counsel for the Calumet and Hecla, answers the question that officials of the union were forced to call the strike by insistence of the rank and file, and said that the constitution of the Western Federation provided that any strike proposition must be first considered by the executive board of the organization before it is submitted to a referendum vote.

A strike of employees. Allan Reece, chief counsel for the companies, responded. He said the communications from the unions had failed to state grievance and each management undertook to ascertain if the Western Federation of Miners really represented the employees of the company.

Mr. Reese reviewed the opening incidents of the strike, saying that the close organization of the union men enabled them to stop all work at the mines because there was then no adequate provision for preserving peace. The resumption of work under protection of the state troops, to whom he paid a tribute, was told by Mr. Reese and he said it was due to the "back-to-work" movement initiated at the Calumet and Hecla. The fact that a big majority of the employees wished to work, confirmed the companies in their decision to have nothing to do with the federation, he said.

Ten Thousand Men at Work. The attorney said that about 10,000 men are at work, of whom 1,500 have been imported. Most of these men came back only on condition that the companies would not permit any federation man, as such, to enter the mines. He said that it would be impossible to obtain harmonious work between union and non-union men. The attitude of the workmen and citizens generally made it impossible for the companies to recede in the least from their determination not to recognize the federation. The companies are still willing to take back such members of the rank and file as have remained out because of extravagant statements and promises. The operators, however, felt they had waited long enough.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 8.—The comptroller of the currency early today dispatched a national bank examiner to Pensacola, Fla., to look into the affairs of the First National bank of Pensacola, which failed to open its doors today. No detailed information as to the cause of the cessation of business by the bank has reached the Treasury department. The last report on the condition of the bank showed its capital at \$200,000, deposits, \$1,362,783, gross assets, \$2,351,860.
