Husband is Charged With Drugging Wife and Burning House

NEARNEY, Neb., Jan. 8.—(Special Telegram)—Deputy Fire Commissioner H. T. Raquette arrested T. J. Cahill at Arnold this noon and brought his prisoner to Kearney this afternoon. On Monday the home of Cahill was burned and his wife, who had been drugged and chloroformed, nearly lost her life in the fire.

The blaze was discovered by neighbors, who rushed to the Cahill home and rescued Mrs. Cahill just before the fire reached where she lay unconscious. Mrs. Cahill was worked over for hours before she revived and since that time has been hysterical.

The home was undoubtedly set on fire and Cahill is now charged with the fire in order to obtain the insurance. The home was worth \$2,000 and was insured to full value. A rigid investigation is being made to find how far Cahill may be involved in the attempted murder. The home was fired in several places, the smell of kerosene and of the drug being very strong when discovered. Enough evidence against Cahill is held by the commissioner to hold him until an investigation can be made.

Raquette is reticent regarding evidence against Cahill, but stated that he thought "it was a plain case of attempted murder and arson."

Cahill will be held at Lincoln, to which place he was taken, until Mrs. Cahill is able to tell her story about the fire and the drugging.

State Banks Have No Right to Buy Federal Institution Stocks

(From a Staff Correspondent.) LINCOLN, Jan. 8.—(Special.)—Do the banking laws of Nebraska prevent state banks from acquiring stock in federal reserve banks? is a question which has been asked of Secretary Royse of the State Banking board in a letter from Edward H. Doyle, Detroit, Mich., president of the National Association for Supervision of State Banks.

The association is to hold a meeting in either Detroit or Chicago on January 19 and the different states of the country have been asked to be represented.

Nebraska

The law of Nebraska says: No corporation transacting a banking business shall make any loan or discount on the security of the shares of its own capital, or the shares of any other corporation, or the shares of any corporation unless such security or purchase shall be necessary to prevent loss upon debt previously contracted in good faith; and such stock so purchased or acquired shall within six months after the time of its purchase be sold or disposed of at a public or private sale; or in default thereof a receiver shall be appointed to close up the business of the bank. Provided that in no case shall the amount of stock so held exceed five per cent of the paid up capital of such bank.

According to this section of the law, Secretary Royse says that state banks in Nebraska will have no right to acquire stock in federal reserve banks. Kansas, Missouri and Michigan have similar laws.

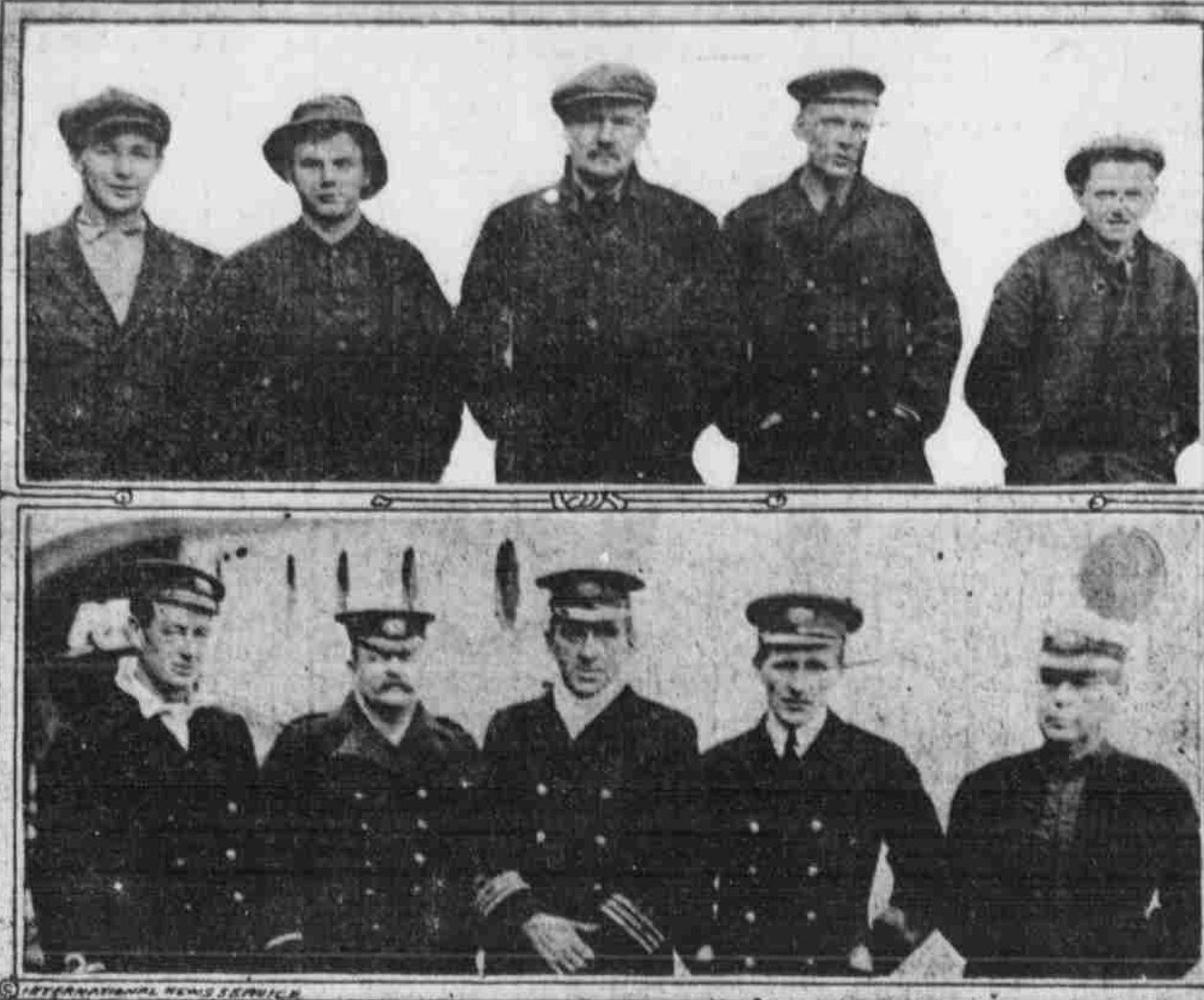

MUST RECOUNT THE NAMES

City Clerk of Lincoln So Ordered by Courts on Recall of King.

THREW OUT PETITION TWICE

Official Mandamus Refuses to Pass on Names Signed to the Instrument Asking that Commissioner Be Fired.

(From a Staff Correspondent.) LINCOLN, Jan. 8.—(Special.)—A writ of mandamus was allowed in the district court of Lancaster county today to compel the city clerk of Lincoln to recount the names upon the petition filed for the recall of Commissioner King of the public safety department.

Nebraska

The first petitions filed in the recall contained something over 1,800 names and the clerk threw out about 60 per cent of these, claiming that they were not on the register as living at the places designated. This left the recall petition about 300 or 400 names short of the required number and an additional petition was circulated and filed containing about 800 names. The clerk threw out sufficient names in this petition so that the number was below the required amount to call the election and now the mandamus is brought to compel the clerk to recertify the petitions.

It is claimed that nearly 1,000 of the names thrown out are those of voters in Lincoln, who have changed their address since the last register day, but are entitled to have their names retained on the petition as voters of the city. If these are called into court to swear to their legal residence in the city it will be a nice sum for the taxpayers to pay.

BOYS WHO SHOT AT CHILDREN GIVE BONDS

BROKEN BOW, Neb., Jan. 8.—(Special.)—Alfred and Dale Smith and John Simpson, the three boys charged with disturbing the peace of school district No. 2 two weeks ago, by maliciously discharging loaded firearms among the children, had a hearing Tuesday before Justice Warrington of Mason. The youthful defendants pleaded guilty to the charge and were fined. The justice then placed each boy under a bond of \$100 and required that the three should report to him personally each month as to good behavior. Should the defendants show an inclination to again become "bad men" the bonds will be forfeited and they will become subject to re-arrest. The parents of the boys paid the fines and signed the bonds.

Secretary Royse of State Banking Board After Rudolph Wing

(From a Staff Correspondent.) LINCOLN, Jan. 8.—(Special.)—Rudolph H. Wing of Omaha, representing the National Mercantile company of Vancouver, Canada, has been called upon by Secretary Royse of the State Banking board to show cause why he should not be prosecuted for doing business and soliciting in this state without first securing a license from the board.

The company which Mr. Wing represents advertises in papers of the state and is putting out circulars showing that they will guarantee loans at 3 per cent, and when an applicant has paid in a certain number of payments he will be "entitled" to make application for a loan. This is along the same line as the scheme of another which has made considerable trouble for the state board through its promising that when a certain number of payments had been made the applicant would be "eligible" to receive the loan. Unfortunately the applicant found that the word "eligible" did not guarantee anything, and after waiting a long time and the eligibility did not bring anything he generally ceased his payments.

Nebraska Banks May Not Enter Federal Reserve System

LINCOLN, Jan. 8.—By an opinion of Attorney General Grant Martin of Nebraska, given today on a Nebraska banking law, state banks in this state will be prohibited from entering the federal reserve system. The law prohibits the banks from owning stock in any corporation, and on this Mr. Martin's opinion is based. The situation is not considered important enough by Governor Morehead to call a special session of the legislature to amend the law and the matter will rest until the legislature of 1915.
