DES MOINES BANKERS DIFFER

Division of Sentiment in Iowa Capital Over Reserve System.

BUSINESS MEN SEND MESSAGE

Want Inclusion in Chicago District, While Clearing House is Out After One of the Reserve Banks.

(From a Staff Correspondent.)
DES MOINES, Jan. 8.—(Special Telegram)—It was disclosed today that the division of sentiment here as to what Des Moines should do about the federal reserve banks.

The booster committee sent a telegram to the organization committee in Washington asking that Des Moines be placed in the Chicago district and asking opportunity to be heard on the proposition. At the same time the Clearing House association has presented to the same committee a request that Des Moines wants to be made the location of one of the reserve banks. Only four banks of the city can enter the system, as all state and savings banks are barred in this state.

No Change in Iowa.
It was stated by state officials today that in case of the absence of Frank Sheridan from prison in Colorado he is at liberty to return to Iowa and remain, as there is nothing against him in this state. The wife-in-law, while living here, secured a divorce and has married again and is living here.

Desire Complete Ticket.
A complete ticket for Iowa, including candidates for United States senator, the eleven congressional districts and every state and county officer appeared to be the almost unanimous sentiment of arriving progressive leaders here today. The formal state-wide conference will be held tomorrow, but informal conferences are in progress among party leaders. Tonight Hainbridge Colby, a progressive leader of New York, delivered an address on "The Progress of Progressivism."

Among those attending the conference from outside of the state are O. K. Davis, secretary of the progressive national committee; W. E. Cadmus of Florida, who will deliver an address tomorrow; and George Fitzh, also of Florida, who is on the program for an address tomorrow night.

Two Sidelined Planners Dead.
SIDNEY, Ia., Jan. 8.—(Special Telegram)—Two townships were held in Sidney yesterday. Abraham Travis and Thomas I. Wilson were laid to rest in the Sidney cemetery. Both were old residents and well advanced in years.

Abraham Travis was 86 years of age. He was born in Pike county, O., in 1827, settling in Fremont county, near Sidney, in 1852. He was the father of twelve children, all of whom are living except one. He leaves thirty-three grandchildren and ten great-grandchildren. His wife died thirteen years ago. Mr. Travis was a successful farmer and his sons have for many years been identified with the business interests of Sidney.

Motor Car Institutes Popular in Iowa

AMES, Ia., Jan. 8.—(Special.)—The people of Iowa who foot the bills for the upkeep of motor cars already are showing a tremendous degree of interest in the institutes which the engineering extension faculty of Ames shall hold all over the state within the next few months. The engineering extension workers scarcely had made a simple announcement of the "automobile institute" project before the desk of J. W. Perry, secretary of engineering extension, was filled with encouraging letters of encouragement from commercial and booster clubs and development organizations from a big proportion of the cities of the state.

The extension people thought that perhaps they had a task before them to convince the automobile owners that they could eliminate 90 per cent of tire expenses alone if they knew how to inflate tires and fix up the rubber cuts at the right time, but the automobile owner will need no "nagging" to go to the institutes, judging from the interest he is showing.

It was at first planned to hold institutes in sixteen to twenty cities for a week at each place, but whole week institutes will be denied everywhere, three-day ones to be held instead, and forty institutes instead of twenty.

The booster organizations will stand the expense of the institutes and throw them open to residents of their respective counties free. The object of the institutes is to teach owners and operators the principles of operating cars, caring for motors and keeping down the enormous upkeep cost in general.
