TO KNOW IT IS TO LIKE IT

L. J. Quinby So Pleads Before Barristers for Single Tax.

ONLY ONE SOURCE OF WEALTH

That is the Land, and the Only Satisfactory Way to Make It Accessible to Man is by Labor.

L. J. Quinby addressed the Barristers' club, an organization of young attorneys, at the luncheon at the University club, Saturday noon.

"To appreciate the single tax and to understand it, I believe that one must understand its basic principles," said Mr. Quinby. "The single taxer believes that the moral principle involved is that any economic condition which transfers wealth from one person to another without compensation is dishonest and wrong. I charge that to refrain from doing so is impossible under the present system of government and taxation. It is impossible for me to return the wealth I gain to those to whom it really belongs, as conditions exist now."

One Source of Wealth.

"There is only one source of wealth, and that is the earth. There is only one way to make that wealth accessible to man, and that is by labor. Therefore wealth is produced by labor applied to the land, for there is no other method of creating wealth. Since this is the case, the laborer must and should have access to the land. It is important that the land be free, but we know that it is not free, for the government and taxation have been so manipulated that much land is held out of use under the present system."

"In the place of this condition, we offer a system of economic society in the present tax. We must derive the taxation for the support of the entire government from the land or the products of labor. As you tax labor, you discourage the production of wealth and industrial effort."

The election of officers of the Barristers' club will be held at the regular meeting on February 7.

THREE PROMINENT MEN WILL SPEAK HERE SOON

Three of the prominent speakers now scheduled by the Commercial club to deliver addresses at the public affairs luncheons shortly, are George Knapp of Pueblo, I. K. Pond of Chicago and Dr. Woods Hutchinson of New York City. Knapp will talk on the single tax, as he was largely instrumental in putting through the new tax system in Pueblo, which is said in a measure to approach the single tax system. Pond is a leading architect of Chicago. He is to talk to the club on city planning. Dr. Woods Hutchinson is to discuss public health. Knapp speaks January 27, Pond January 22 and Hutchinson January 20.

Lumbermen Want Juniors to Attend

The younger generation is wanted in the lumber business in Nebraska, according to invitations that are being sent out by the Nebraska Lumber Dealers' association asking that the young men, the sons of the dealers, or the sons of friends of the dealers attend the convention of the association on the second day of the meeting in Lincoln, January 15. The convention is to hold three days, January 14 to 16.

In a letter sent out by Secretary E. E. Hall of Lincoln, he has the following to say on the younger generation:

"The second day, January 15, will be devoted largely to the younger generation of lumbermen and will be known as 'Junior day.' To make this a success it is impossible for me not only to furnish the entertainment, but to also provide the guests. To that end we are taking the liberty of asking you to suggest upon the enclosed card the name of some young man who may at present be interested in the lumber business, or who might become so, to whom we may extend a personal invitation to be with us as much of the time during the convention as possible, and on the 15th particularly."

Negro Family Would Adopt White Baby

Mr. and Mrs. John Smallwood, negroes, who live at Twenty-ninth and Decatur streets, have applied to the county court for permission to adopt a 3-months-old white baby.

The mother appeared in court with the prospective foster parents and gave her consent to the adoption.

The applicants were informed that an investigation would be made before permission to adopt the baby would be given, and the case was referred to the juvenile authorities.

DAVIS BOUND OVER TO THE DISTRICT COURT

H. D. Davis, 23 North Eighteenth street, has been bound over to the district court with bonds fixed at \$750. He is charged with obtaining money under false pretenses.

William Ziemer of Waterloo, Neb., who filed the complaint, declares he paid Davis and McMahan of South Omaha \$300 for four horses, with an understanding that on their delivery in good condition he would give \$50 more. The horses were not forthcoming the following day, and Ziemer sought Davis for an explanation.

The latter declared that McMahan possessed the horses and money, but he would give Ziemer \$50 out of his own pocket, as he thought McMahan had skipped.

Ziemer, not satisfied, decided that he had been busosed and filed a complaint against both men. McMahan cannot be located.

OUTLOOK BETTER FOR IDLE

Many Are Being Fed and Ice Work Will Soon Be On.

HUNGER SITUATION IS OVER

Various Benevolent Associations Are Taking Care of Those Who Have No Money to Buy Food With.

Now that six free meals are being served to idle men each week and ice cutting work will probably begin soon, the need of a free central employment bureau to find jobs for the idle men is not pressing, according to members of the charity conference. They are inclined to believe that they had better find warm clothing for the ice workers and refrain from starting the employment bureau unless warm weather delays the work on the ice.

Major F. A. McCormick of the Volunteers has now arranged to provide free bread, butter and coffee to idle men on Tuesday and Friday evenings and Sunday morning, instead of just once a week. Superintendent M. Andreasen of the Society for the Friendless has also provided free stew and bread for the men on Wednesday, Thursday and Saturday nights, so that the hunger situation among the idle men is no longer acute.

"Fewer men are now applying for work," Major McCormick says. "Many men have been placed in temporary positions, so the situation among the unemployed is not so alarming, but many men will need warm overcoats, gloves and coats or they will be unable to accept work on the ice when it is offered."

County Commissioner J. C. Lynch was unexpectedly called out of the city Friday, so arrangements for the free employment bureau in the court house will not be completed until Monday, when the situation may not warrant installing it, Dr. Ira Porter, chairman of the charity conference says.

Donations of warm clothing or money to purchase it may be made to the Associated Charities or any of the other charitable institutions.
