In Opera in Europe.

The news of repeated successes of Miss Minna E. Meyer in opera and concert abroad has reached Omaha and will be a source of pleasure to her many friends, as well as the friends of her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Morris Meyer.

Miss Meyer is a native Omaha girl, and possesses a sweetly pert and natural talent and artistic temperament besides such other qualifications as are essential for ultimate success and artistic achievement. Endowed with indomitable perseverance and a robust physical constitution she has taken hold of the arduous task before her and made good. This at least is attested by press references to her recent debut in the leading part of "La Boheme" at the Metropol (eastern Prussia) Stadt-Theater. The critic comments in terms of highest praise and speaks of the complete satisfaction given by the exponent of the leading role.

In a review of a later concert wherein Miss Meyer participated in one of the most prominent parts, we read as follows: "Miss Minna E. Meyer is a singer who is completely familiar with the concert platform. She possesses a voluminous soprano, attaining brilliant heights. The always reliable formation of her head-tones speaks volumes for industrious work on her part. Pronunciation and interpretation reveal the splendid training of this young artist whose sympathetic personality left a strong impression." (Translated from a German newspaper.)

For Creighton Glee Club.

Two artists of well-known ability will be a feature at the Creighton University Glee club in its fourth annual concert at the Brandeis theater February 4. They are Miss Lucille Tewksbury Stevenson of Chicago and Miss Marie Von Unschuid, court pianist for the queen of Roumania.

Miss Stevenson appeared in Omaha about four years ago before the Tuesday Morning Musical club under the name Tewksbury, but has since changed her name to Stevenson. Since that time she has made an extended trip to Europe, and in a recent appearance at Winnipeg, Manitoba, critics pronounced her a "perfect artist with a lovely, fresh, soprano voice."

Miss Unschuid is the wife of one of the embassy to the French government and is the daughter of one of the leading officers in the Austrian army. She was educated in the conservatory at Vienna and has numerous medals and inscriptions for her work before European audiences. She appeared recently before a very select audience in Washington at a concert given by the Austrian embassy.

Miss Unschuid will deliver a lecture on the "Technical Training Necessary for the Pianist of Today" on the afternoon of February 4 at the university auditorium under the auspices of the university.
