BAN PUT ON ROLLER TOWEL

State Board of Health of Iowa Takes This Action.
ABOLISHED FROM PUBLIC PLACES
 Justice Corcoran of Des Moines Clears Gypsy King from Extortion Charge, but Scores People as Undesirable.

(From a Staff Correspondent.)
 DES MOINES, Ia., Jan. 14.—(Special Telegram.)—The State Board of Health today adopted a resolution for a ruling abolishing the roller towel from all hotels and public places in Iowa in the interest of health, and directing the state health inspectors to report on the use of the common towel in any form in any public place in the state.

The board claims the right to do this under the law because of the common towel being a menace to health. John Corcoran, justice of the peace, today found John Mitchell, gypsy king, not guilty of threats to extort. The charge was filed by Ed Binbo, a gypsy, who claimed that Mitchell tried to force the Binbo family to pay over \$200 after they had paid \$1.50, so that George Binbo might marry Mary Mitchell, the king's daughter.

In rendering his decision Justice Corcoran told the gypsies that they all should be deported from the United States because they were undesirable citizens.

LOBECK PREPARED TO FIGHT

Congressman from Omaha Will Object to Literacy Test for Aliens.
ACTION URGED BY LEADING MEN
 Receives Many Messages from Friends—Amendment Urged to Punish Asylum for Those Persecuted for Religion.

(From a Staff Correspondent.)
 WASHINGTON, Jan. 14.—(Special Telegram.)—When the Burnett amendment to the immigration bill comes before the house, and it is liable to be precipitated on the floor through a rule at any time, Congressman Lobbeck is prepared to fight the literacy test by speech as well as by sentiments of many naturalized citizens of all nationalities. Mr. Lobbeck has been gathering a mass of data which he will put in the Congressional Record in opposition to the Burnett amendment, his mail today containing many letters from influential citizens throughout the country protesting against the adoption of the literacy test as applied to intending citizens.

Among the telegrams which the Omaha representative received today on the Burnett amendment was one from A. G. Johnson, editor and publisher of the *Folkets Tidning* (People's News) of Milwaukee, in which the editor said: "I voice sentiments of friends and citizens asking you to oppose Burnett literacy test, because it will bar from our country strong and honest labor which the country sorely needs for development of our resources."

Many Take Same View.
 These sentiments, differently expressed, are concurred in by A. T. Thorson of the Omaha Post, a Swedish weekly; Yac Nurech, president of the Pokrok Publishing company of Omaha; Thomas Kazand, publisher of a Polish newspaper of South Omaha; N. Fabemanni, publisher of the *People's Courier*, an Italian paper of Omaha; Val J. Peter, publisher of the Omaha Tribune, a German paper; John J. Rosicky, president of the National Printing company; Leo Kowalski, editor of a Polish paper, and Sigmund Neide, the well known editor of the *Danish Pioneer*.

Resawater Suggests Amendment.
 Victor Resawater, editor of *The Bee*, who has shown a most active interest in connection with the Burnett amendment, has submitted an amendment to Mr. Lobbeck which will be offered probably as a substitute. This amendment of the editor of *The Bee* provides "that all aliens who shall prove to the proper immigration officials of the secretary of labor that they are seeking admission to the United States to avoid religious persecution, whether such persecution be evidenced by overt acts or by discriminatory or oppressive laws or regulations, shall be exempt from the operation of the literacy test."

STATEMENT BY JUDGE REESE

(Continued from Page One.)
 In the matter, the motion was argued in my absence and when the question of granting the rehearing came up I found by the discussion that Judges Letton, Fawcett and Sedgwick each desired the rehearing. Judges Barnes, Hamer, and Rose opposing it. Judge Barnes and Hamer, while protesting against my vote, did it in a gentlemanly and perfectly friendly way. I stated that the vote would not be completed then and that I would take time to consider the matter more fully, and that when I did vote it would be upon my own judgment. The matter went over to a later sitting.

Confers with Deemer.
 A few days thereafter I met Judge Deemer at a meeting of the State Bar association at Omaha, a long time member of the Iowa supreme court and former chief justice thereof, and in whose integrity and ability, I with all others so far as I know, have the fullest confidence, and I presented the matter to him involving the case, and he advised me to my duty. He frankly gave it, saying that the question was upon a matter of procedure only and had nothing to do with the merits of the case, and if three judges were requesting the opportunity for further investigation, he thought I should vote to give it to them. When the question again came up I stated to all my associates, the conversation with Judge Deemer, my judgment in the matter, which agreed with my own, and I should and did vote upon the motion by which the rehearing was granted.

"I did what I conceived to be my plain duty in the matter. If I erred, the error was my own. I cannot conceive of an occasion ever arising where three of my associates are demanding an opportunity to further hear and investigate a cause against those who desire to deny that right, that I should remain silent and by my silence deny that right, even though I may be disqualified to pass upon the merits of the case.

Three Judges Might Act.
 "It is my belief that a case is pending until the doors of the court are finally closed against it. The filing of an opinion, either affirming or reversing a judgment of the district court is but one of the steps in the litigation, subject to be overturned by a higher court, and never to be granted and the case heard further. If upon an application for rehearing the six judges are equally divided and this should be held to be a refusal to rehear the case, the doors of the court are effectively closed by the three judges, and the decision is, in effect, rendered by the three, while the constitution and statutes require the concurrence of four.

Connection with Case.
 "At the time of the failure of the Capital National bank of Lincoln, over twenty years ago, Mr. Jones of the Jones National bank of Seward applied to me to assist in procuring a return to him of certain remittances which he had made to that bank after its failure, perhaps on the day its doors closed. I went to the bank, I think alone, but Mr. Jones may have been with me, when assurance was given by the national bank cashier that the Jones National bank would be protected and that the remittances so made would not go into the bank funds. I am not very clear as to the details of what occurred at the bank, but my recollection is that the Jones mail was surrendered unopened and carried away. As to this I am entirely satisfied. FOUR FIRES IN NEW YORK

Thousands Persons Driven from Homes in Tenements.
CATHOLIC COLLEGE BURNED
 Friends and Thirty Students Escape from Burning Building at Catskill—Loss is Estimated at Hundred Thousand.

NEW YORK, Jan. 14.—Four fires, in rapid succession, in widely separated parts of the city, caused intense suffering to nearly a thousand tenants this morning while the temperature hovered around zero. The first blaze, in a Bowers lodging house, drove 130 shivering people from the structure, 400 from a lodging house adjoining and twenty-eight families from tenements nearby.

Fifteen Families Routed.
 Fifteen families were routed from a five-story apartment house at Sixty-first street and Columbus avenue. While this blaze was in progress fire attacked a lower East Side tenement, and drove 300 to the streets. In none of the fires was any one seriously injured. Firemen suffered keenly from the cold.

Catholic College Burned.
 CATSKILL, N. Y., Jan. 14.—The large wooden building on the bluff overlooking the Hudson, near Catskill Point, occupied by St. Anthony's Seraphic College and Novitiate, was destroyed by fire today. The priests and thirty students escaped, but most of their effects. A temperature of 20 below zero made the hydrants useless and the firemen stood helpless.

The building was erected forty years ago as a hotel, with rooms for 400 guests. The Franciscan Fathers bought it five years ago and converted it into a provincial house. The loss was estimated at \$100,000, with \$50,000 insurance.

STATE SOON TO PURSUE ALL KINDS OF BACTERIA

 LINCOLN, Jan. 14.—(Special.)—The new state bacteriological laboratory will soon be in running order in the rooms on the fourth floor of the state house. The State Board of Health met this morning and after clearing up the work of the year took up matters pertaining to the work of the new department.

During the year four reciprocal certificates have been granted to physicians desiring practice in this state, coming from other states, and six certificates have been issued to those leaving the state.

The license of the Tinley maternity home at Omaha was recalled and the home denied the right to continue as a maternity home.
 A maternity license was issued to the Salvation Army for a maternity hospital at Omaha.

Dr. Snow, the physician who has been before the board for more than a year on a charge of illegal practice, after a hearing was declared not guilty, and her certificate allowed to remain in force.
 The board will issue in a short time a pamphlet covering the work of the year with the vital statistics of the state shown.

MINDEN, Neb., Jan. 13.—(Special.)—Rev. G. E. Pariseo, pastor of the First Presbyterian church of Minden, Neb., has resigned his pastorate in this church. He has accepted a pastorate at the Presbyterian church of Janesville, Wis., to which place he will move in February.

EMPLOYE OF THE BURNED ESTABLISHMENT ACCUSED
 KEARNEY, Neb., Jan. 14.—(Special Telegram.)—State Fire Commissioner Ridgeoll made a thorough investigation of the Barts incendiary fire on Wednesday afternoon, and at 7 o'clock tonight arrested Ray Humphrey, a local young man, in connection with the case. Humphrey was lodged in the county jail awaiting a hearing. The young man is an employe of the Barts poultry establishment.

YORK MAN IS CHARGED WITH EMBEZZLEMENT

YORK, Neb., Jan. 14.—(Special.)—W. B. Lehman, a local insurance agent, was arrested Monday night on the charge of embezzling \$500 belonging to the Mutual Automobile company of Omaha. His bail was fixed at \$1,000, which he could not furnish, and he was placed in jail.

DEATH RECORD

Seven Williams.
 KEARNEY, Neb., Jan. 14.—(Special.)—Queen Williams, who died in an Omaha hospital on Monday, was one of the most prominent hog breeders in this section. He was 63 years of age and had resided in this county for over thirty years. He was the owner of a beautiful farm here and was one of the first men to breed fancy pigs in this section and the first man to advocate the breeding of alfalfa.

Greeno Banker to Dead.
 OCONTO, Neb., Jan. 14.—(Special Telegram.)—Joseph O. Berry, vice-president of the Farmers' bank died at his home here Monday evening, aged 55 years. He was well known among bankers of Omaha and Council Bluffs. The funeral will be held Thursday.
