### GOETHALS TO GOVERN CANAL

Secretary Garrison Submits Plan to the President.

### WILL ABOLISH THE COMMISSION

It is Understood Executive is Preparing Order to Place Army Engineer at Head of the New Administration.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 16.—Secretary Garrison submitted today to President Wilson his plan for the permanent government of the Panama canal zone. While the secretary would not disclose its features it is understood it contemplates making Colonel George W. Goethals, the first governor of the zone with plenary powers and would create from the retiring members of the Canal commission a new commission to take charge of the ceremonies preparing for the opening of the canal in January, 1915.

An executive order abolishing the Isthmian Canal commission is understood to be in preparation by the president, in accordance with the provisions of the Adams act.

Unless Colonel William C. Gorgas is made surgeon general of the army, or chosen for some other important work, he will be continued with the other members of the new commission, whose salaries are to remain the same, but who will serve only until the canal is opened.

### PAWNEE FARMERS HEAR SEATON AND LIEBERS

PAWNEE CITY, Jan. 16.—(Special.)—The Pawnee County Farmers' Institute opened here yesterday morning, with a good sized audience in attendance. Prof. L. F. Seaton of the state agricultural college opened the morning session with a talk on "The Gasoline Engine, Construction and Uses." He was followed by Prof. Liebers of Beatrice, who spoke on "The Farm Silo." The afternoon session brought out a larger crowd, who enjoyed interesting talks by Seaton and Liebers on "The Automobile on the Farm" and "Dairying on the Farm."

## GERMANY PROPOSES JOINT PROTEST BY POWERS TO MEXICO

(Continued from Page One.)

detachments had been drifting along the road for several days, but it was not until daylight today that the main body departed. Major McNamee of the United States border patrol rode at the head of the long column with an escort of three troops from the Fourteenth cavalry while the two troops brought up the rear. Each of the horses, which were brought across the river with the routed Mexicans, bore at least two riders, usually a man and a woman. Burros carried Comstock belongings packed in bundles on both sides with children perched on top.

Despite their ragged appearance, which suggested only misery and hunger, the soldiers and women were in merry spirits. Now and then groups of soldiers broke into song while others at the stopping places ate with great eagerness the rations supplied by the American troops. The whole procession winding through the mountain passes was a picture of primitive movement of people before the days of railroads.

It will be Monday night before the refugees arrive at Marfa to board the train which await there to carry them to El Paso.

Villa Plans Aggressive Campaign. CHIHUAHUA, Jan. 16.—Definite announcement was made by General Francisco Villa today that he will enter the central and southern states of Mexico with a rebel army of 15,000 soldiers. He will attempt to join forces with General Carranza at Guadalupe, where an army of 25,000 or more will begin a march toward Mexico City.

"We will strike a blow which the Huerta government will be unable to withstand," said General Villa, after he had been in communication by telegraph with General Carranza, who is in Sinaloa state.

He said he had been informed that General Carranza could muster 10,000 men, and that his own army was being increased daily. On the southward march he and General Carranza, said he would command the largest unified revolutionary force ever assembled in Mexico.

General Villa brought here as a result of his victory at Ojinaga 5,000 rifles, 12 cannon and 7 rapid firing guns, captured from the federals.

Villa's forces are distributed as follows: City of Chihuahua, 9,000; Santa Rosalia, 2,000; Jimenez, 2,000. These, with the forces of Yarral, and the men under General Urbina, south of Escalon, will be in the march on Mexico City, with the exception of those necessary to police the country to the north.

Groups of deserters from the Huertistas are treating for amnesty and wish to join in the movement south, General Villa said.

The Huertistas have burned all the bridges between Bernalillo and Torreon, and have retired to that place after having been defeated by Urbina near Matamoros.

For the last eight or nine years, since the state game warden's office became an active one, this matter has been threshed out again and again and many promises have been made by the company to comply. Upon his return to this city from Lewis Mr. Jackson stated that he found that there is a fishway in the Lewis dam, but that it is not large enough to accommodate the largest fish. The Lewis people agreed to remodel it to conform to the requirements when spring opens up, as the warden would not accept the present one.
