

Villa Plan's Aggressive Campaign. CHIHUAHUA, Jan. 16.-Definite announcement was made by General Francisco Villa today that he will enter the central and southern states of Mexico with a rebel army of 15,000 soldiers. He will attempt to join forces with General Carranza at Guadalajara, where an army of 25,000 or more will begin a march to-

"We will strike a blow which the Huerta government will be unable to withstand," said General Villa, after he had been in communication by telegraph with General Carranza, who is in Sinaloa

He said he had been informed that General Carransa could muster 10,000 men, and that his own army was being increased daily. On the southward march he and General Carranza, said he, would amand the largest unified revolutionary force ever assembled in Mexico.

General Villa brought here as a result of his victory at Olinaga 3,000 rifles. 12 dean of the life insurance presidents of cannon and 7 rapid firing gune, captured from the federals.

Villa's forces are distributed as follows: City of Chihuahua, 9,000; Santa Rosalis, 2,000; Jimenez, 2,000.
