Routes Open to Mexico City. VILLA PREPARING EXPEDITION

Insurgent General Hopes to Oper Way to Advance on Capital Within Few Days-Makes Trip to Junres.

CHIHUAHUA, Mex., Jan. 21.-Orders were issued by General Francisco Villa today for a concentration of rebel forces along the railroad north of Torreon. The rebels scattered in the state of Durango and Coahulla and the garrison in Juarez were ordered to join those at Chihuahua, with a view of preparing a formidable front in the projected rebel advance southward.

Evidences have multiplied that the federals at Torreon are determined if possible to check the rebellion at that point. Torreon is now the northernmost federal stronghold, in the heart of the republic. The federals hold that if the revolutionary movement from the north is to be halted at all it must be halted there, and that the loss of Torreon to the rebels would leave the way open for Villa's advance to Saltillo, Monterey, and cities near Mexico City.
