Tinker Announces At Wickland, Chicago Youth Playing Center with Reds Last Year, Signs.

CHICAGO, Jan. 28.—The new Federal league decided today the implications made by leaders of organized base ball that the main body of the players inclined to desert to the new league were those who were nearing the end of their playing days.

"We are going after young ball players, and we've got a lot of them," Manager Joe Tinker of the Chicago Federals asserted.

To substantiate his statement he announced that Al Wickland, a Chicago youth who played center field with Cincinnati last year, had signed today to play with Tinker's team.

American league followers took heart tonight when C. W. Somers, president of the Cleveland club, announced that Ray Chapman, the Cleveland shortstop, had signed a five-year contract with the Naps and Gray.

Somers visited both President Johnson of the American league and President Chivington of the American association, but declined to tell what subjects were discussed.

Fraternity Players Are Allowed to Sign Minor League Pacts

NEW YORK, Jan. 28.—The Base Ball Players' Fraternity today withdrew its order instructing players not to sign minor league contracts, a satisfactory agreement having been reached with the leading minor leagues of the National association.

For the last two days the Base Ball Players' Fraternity has been in communication with Mr. Jarosh, president of the International league, also acting for the Pacific Coast league; Mr. Chivington of the American association and Judge Kavanaugh, president of the Southern association, also empowered to act for the Western league.

We have been assured that all contracts signed by the players will be subject to the provision already inserted by the National commission in the major league contracts as far as the clause suspending the player is concerned; also that contracts signed in the future will have the clause stricken irrespective of what action the National association takes.

Although the association still persists in its arbitrary stand, rather than further embarrass the gentlemen named who have been absolutely fair in all their dealings, it was decided to notify our members that the objection to signing contracts is withdrawn.

Hanlon Says Feds Hurt Minors Most

STOUX CITY, Ia., Jan. 28.—(Special to The Bee).—The advent of the Federal league is no joke for anyone in the minor leagues," declares E. J. Hanlon, vice president of the Western league, on his return from an eastern trip.

"It isn't the majors who should worry over the new league," he said, "it's the minors. The big major clubs can well spare a player or two each, even when the loss is that of a star, but when a minor league club drops a prize player it is a severe blow and the outlaws will make real trouble for us before they get through."

Hanlon incidentally announced that the schedule meeting would be held on February 8, and that he would stand pat for a 154-game schedule. "The club owners have already decided upon this," he said, "and there is certainly no reason now why they should change."

The local magazine stated that plans for the new ball park to replace the one destroyed by fire last season, are not yet ready for announcement. He reported the receipts signed contracts for a half dozen Sioux players.

JOHNNY DUNDEE TROUNCES O'NEILL OF ENGLAND

NEW YORK, Jan. 28.—In the first of the two international bouts at Madison Square Garden tonight Johnny Dundee trounced "Bopper" O'Neill of England.

The local fighter conceded 94 pounds to the visiting pugilist who weighed 135 pounds, but forced the pace from the start. O'Neill showed gameness, but was unable to get the lighter man away.

In the second bout Owen Moran of England, after receiving severe punishment from "Young" Shugrue of Jersey City, quit at the end of the seventh round. In that round Shugrue landed several rights and lefts to the head and then made the body his target. Moran claimed one of the body punches was foul.

HUSSANE TO WRESTLE LAWSON MONDAY NIGHT

Yousif Hussane, the Bulgarian protégé of Farmer Burns, will give another opportunity Monday night at the Krug theater to demonstrate his prowess with Tom Lawson, a 205-pound mat artist who is said to be a considerable catch-as-catch-can grappler.

The men will mix for a side bet of \$100, which has already been posted, as forfeit money. If Hussane should throw Lawson, and such is considered the case by most wrestling fans who have seen the demon foreigner in action, a match will probably be arranged with Jess Westergard.

JIM ROURKE TO HEAD THE GRAND ISLAND CLUB

Jim Rourke, brother of Pa Rourke, Omaha's base ball mogul, has been elected chairman of the board of directors of the Grand Island Base Ball club in the Nebraska state league.

The Grand Island club was almost completely ripped asunder by the internal differences of those on the inside, but the election of Rourke will eliminate any further disturbances along that line and the Grand Island club should travel the path of tranquility for many seasons with an executive director of the caliber of Jim Rourke at its head.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Jan. 28.—Jimmy Clabby, a middleweight pugilist, is held in jail here pending investigation of an alleged attack by the fighter and his trainer upon C. E. Laurance, a policeman. Police officials say Laurance was severely injured, and that if a statement regarding the fight is verified, a felony charge will be placed against Clabby.

OAK PARK GAME POSSIBLE

High School Alumni Want High-Class Contest Here. WILL SOLICIT SUBSCRIPTIONS

Athletic Authorities Think Chicago Team Will Come if Five Hundred Dollars' Worth of Tickets Are Bought.

Omaha High school alumni are getting down to real work in their efforts to provide a game between the local school and Oak Park High school of Chicago here next Thanksgiving day. C. E. Reed, director of athletics of the high school, has announced that he will communicate with the management of the Chicago school.

The alumni have conceived the plan of petitioning for subscriptions from alumni of the school and business men of the city, the amount of the subscription to be accepted as payment for seats at the contest. The expenses for such a game would be about \$500. If this amount is subscribed the game will be almost a certainty.

For several years the Oak Park school has won undisputed interscholastic championships of the United States and a game here with such a school would extend the range of Omaha High school's athletic reputation. The alumni deem it time for the school to extend its athletic activities beyond the narrow confines of the Missouri valley.

JOE LEONO KILLS MEXICAN

Pool Hall Proprietor Shoots Albert Alberti After Quarrel.

HAD BEFRIENDED COUNTRYMAN

Leono Declares He Acted in Self-Defense—His Brother Was Killed Recently in Same Pool Hall.

Albert Alberti, a Mexican barber, was shot and instantly killed last night by Joe Leono, at the latter's pool hall, 1006 Capitol avenue, because the Mexican befriended a fellow countryman.

The killing last night is the second within three months at the same pool hall. Sam Leono, brother of Joe, was killed by a negro named John Jones, now in the county jail, as the result of an argument over a pool game.

Joe Leono claims that he shot last night in self defense, as the Mexican pulled a razor on him. Witnesses declare, however, that the killing was uncalculated.

When found, Alberti was already dead, and Leono was closing up the pool hall preparatory to making his getaway. Officers Whelan and Baris took him to headquarters, where he confessed to the shooting, but again declared he had in order to save his own life. Immediately after the killing, Capt. Dempsey ordered the place closed permanently.

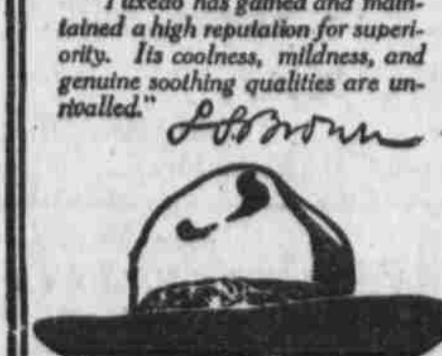
