EVIDENCE IS CONTRADICTORY

Saloon Keeper Charges Anti-Saloon League with False Testimony.

WHISKY NOT BOUGHT THERE

Bloom Insists He Never Sold the Brand of Liqueur Which Agents of League Say They Purchased in Saloon.

Flatly contradictory evidence was offered before the city council, sitting as an ex parte board to hear the protests of the Calvary Baptist church and the Anti-Saloon league on the granting of a liquor license to Joel Bloom, 1402 North Twenty-fourth street. E. H. Wines and L. H. Willeford, for the protestors, said under oath that they purchased Sunnybrook rye at the Bloom saloon after 5 o'clock. Under oath Bloom said he did not now sell, nor had he sold for a year, Sunnybrook rye or any of the other brands of whisky offered as evidence.

By unanimous vote the council, at the afternoon session, declared the evidence did not sustain the protest and the license was ordered issued. Attorneys for the Anti-Saloon league gave notice of appeal.

J. A. Maxwell appeared as a witness for the protestant. Bloom and his brother, Pete Bloom, formerly his bartender, were the only witnesses summoned by the applicants.
