

AFFAIRS AT SOUTH OMAHA

Last Day for Registration at Office in This City. METHODISTS TO ENTER CHURCH Will Take Informal Possession of Basement Next Sunday, While Remainder of Structure to Be Constructed Later.

Today is the last day of registration and those who have not yet taken advantage of the local registration office will have to go to Omaha to register unless they take advantage of the opportunity offered by Commissioner Moorhead today. The office will be opened until 9 o'clock tonight and party leaders are urging the tardy ones to get under the wire.

Many in the north end of town have neglected to register. The democrats have registered fairly well, but the republicans are in the minority by a wide margin. Unless the delinquents register they will not be able to participate in the school board election in May.
